After Chris Barber had played "Mack the Knife" we had a very 'cool' rendering of "It's Alright

with me" by Marty Paich and his Big Band. The trombone came to the fore next with Urbie Green playing a beautifully mellow "Stairway to the Stars. As we know Dennis isn't a great lover of vocals but he was extra kind to us on this first half in that we had TWO vocals. First was Ella Fitzgerald singing "Stone Cold Dead in the Market" calypso and then Robin McKelle an American singer with "Bei Mir Bist du Schon" which translates as My Dear Mr Shane. Nice backing on this last one. Leading up to the interval we had Ben Webster and Johnny Hodges playing "Big Ears" a perfect sound to introduce coffee and biscuits.

The next track has completely rubbished what I said earlier about DS and vocals because here we are again with Helen Mirrill singing "Why don't You Do Right". Then it was on to Chet Baker with a very introspective version of "Over the Rainbow" followed by the 'milky ' tones of Paul Desmond and his Alto Sax playing "Hi-Lillie, Hi-Low. Then guess what?? Another vocal this time it was The Pointer Sisters with "Slow Hand. Then it was on to two big band sounds, the first "Take the A Train" with Jackie Gleason and his Velvet Brass and "Who Me?" with Count Basie which finished off the afternoon. HISTORY GROUP

In February Peter Burgess gave us a talk on the history of the Channel Tunnel. The first suggestion of a tunnel was made by a Frenchman in 1802. By the 1870s the machinery available could bore through the strip of chalk marl which lay beneath the sea. People, such as Queen Victoria and Napoleon III, supported the idea, but the main problems were the railways in the south-east of England, which had a narrower loading

gauge than the French railways. England would be vulnerable to invasion, and who would finance the scheme? Joint committees with the French were set up. Geological studies were undertaken in the 1960s. In 1973 a treaty was agreed, only to be abandoned in 1975 because of the of the railway link to London. In 1979 a Conservative government was elected by which time the influence of the railway companies had waned. In 1981 Thatcher and Mitterand decided to go ahead, finance was found, bids for construction were made in 1985 and in February 1986 a treaty was signed in, of all places, Canterbury Cathedral. The scheme was to consist of two railway tunnels (one in each direction) with an "escape" tunnel in between. Boring started on both sides in 1989, 14,000 workers and 210 banks were involved, the "thin" rolling stock was built and on 6th May 1994 the tunnel was officially opened. It had cost £4.6 billion (50 times the cost of the Suez canal). Nowadays the terminal at Waterloo is unused (St Pancras taking its place) and the company running the tunnel is entirely French.

SCIENCE, NATURE & THINGS TECHNICAL GROUP

The meeting on Friday 13th February 2015 was introduced by our Chairman, Geoff Bridgewater, as a DVD about one of the Seven Wonders of the Industrial Age - the construction of the Hoover Dam during the early 1930s.

The DVD, probably due to time considerations, was very brief about the reasons for building a very large concrete dam in a very remote region of the USA. It concentrated on the construction process, the relentless

drive to get ahead of schedule, the financial costs of falling behind schedule (the government had cost penalties and benefits in the contract to ensure the project was finished to a tight timescale). The human cost in deaths (over 100 in total), the desperate living conditions of the workers - living in crude tents for most of the early time until the government insisted that Boulder City - a constituent part of the contract - be finished so that workers could have somewhere with proper sanitation, water supply and amenities in which to live. Working conditions were always unsafe as there was

no legislation in place to control worker safety and unions were not allowed onto the site (by both company and government). The dam, the largest ever built at the time, was finished well ahead of schedule and has since brought prosperity to the south western region of the USA.
