## THE CHINA DISCUSSION GROUP

Our meeting was held on Friday, 1st May and our topic for discussion was The Three Gorges Dam which spans the Yangtse River. The Three Gorges Dam, completed in 2012, is the world's largest hydro-power project and most notorious dam. The massive project sets records for number of people displaced (more than 1.2 million), number of cities and towns flooded (13 cities, 140 towns, 1,350 villages), and length of reservoir (more than 600 kilometres). We were treated again to a show of photographs taken by some of our members who have visited this site. Patricia introduced the meeting by helping us to revise sounds.

This discussion group developed following the coverage of two on-line courses studied over 3 years and a desire of the group to continue to follow their interest in China past and present. These get-togethers are informal and varied consisting of a short language session, followed by a discussion of a chosen topic often accompanied by a photo presentation and concluding with "what the papers say". Members are welcome to join us for these informal afternoons - there is no set day each month.

## Report of the March 2015 Meeting



The Man with a Diamond in his Tooth.

This month we had a totally different program produced for us by group member John Satchwell. He took one artist, Ferdinand 'Jelly Roll' Morton, and explored the man and his music through the voices of people who worked or were connected in some way with him. These views were collected by

Charles Fox an English writer who specialised in jazz as a critic, author and regular contributor to the BBC Radio 3 Jazz programmes. John took these interviews and wove round them the story of Jelly Roll with appropriate music interspersed. By the age of 14 he was playing jazz in a 'sporting house' and earning his living gambling and pimping, but also composing works including "New Orleans Blues" and "King Porter Stomp". He arrived in New York in 1911 where he introduced the North to 'the blues'. By 1915 his "Jelly Roll Blues" was the first jazz composition ever annotated and published, previously southern blues musicians guarded their work. After a short time in Canada he settled in Chicago and released his first commercial recordings after getting a recording contract with the Victor Recording Studios. His recordings at this time of Jelly Roll Morton and his Red Hot Peppers are regarded as classics of 1920's Jazz. With the Great Depression his recording contracts were not renewed and whilst his compositions were being record by Fletcher Henderson and Benny Goodman he received no royalties from these recordings. In 1938 Alan Lomax the music folklorist invited Jelly Roll to record music and interviews of his life and music, These form the basis of a fascinating look into jazz history.

Jelly Roll is widely recognised as a pivotal figure in early jazz, most notably his being an arranger of what until that time had been a genre rooted in improvisation. A few remarks from people around him were 'Very Self Important Person', 'Egotist', 'Bragadocious', 'bumptious'; all probably true but he was also a great piano player and a great composer and arranger of the Blues.

A truly splendid introduction to our discussion topic "Is this a good time to be old" deservedly earned Colin Robberts the accolade of Grump of the Month. Using the extensive research he had undertaken, Colin took us on a journey through the 20th century to present day illustrating the contrasting conditions "enjoyed" by old people. Poor sanitation and housing, disease and malnutrition meant life expectancy was about 47 years in 1900 compared with about 80 years today due to vast improve-

ments in all aspects of our standard of living and advances in medical science. Colin covered many salient points which led him to conclude that, although far from perfect, there hasn't been a better time to grow old but he warned that in our more affluent and selfish society there was a danger that loneliness amongst the elderly could become a real problem. Generally the Group agreed with Colin's conclusions although the IT revolution caused concern amongst some Grumps that more mature citizens were now being excluded from many activities they had previously undertaken. Others stressed the many positives associated with the computer age particularly the development of "tablets" (the electronic kind!!). Some worried that the changing mix in the population of the UK would have a detrimental affect on our way of life in the future and therefore old age may be less satisfactory than currently. **HISTORY GROUP** Sheela Burchill



In April David Ball gave us an illustrated talk on the history of the Black Country, which lies to the west of Birmingham and which acquired its name in the middle of the 19<sup>th</sup> Century when thousands of furnaces and chimneys filled the air with smoke and the mining of coal, ironstone, fire clay and limestone created large areas of dereliction. There had been iron working and coal mining since the middle ages but it was the advent of machinery which led to the industrialisation of the region. In 1712 Thomas

Newcomen built the first successful steam engine and this was developed further by James Watt. It was used to pump water from the mines. A full scale working replica of the 1712 engine can be seen in the Black Country Living Museum at Dudley. In the many buildings on the site, craftsmen and demonstrators re-create activities such as mining, chain-making, brewing, glass-cutting and brick making. There are various shops - sweets, bakers, pawnbrokers, hardware, chemists. A toll house, chapel, public house and Workers' Institute represent a cross section of the social and industrial history of the region. The museum operates an electric tramway system and there are horse drawn delivery carts and travellers' wagons in the collection. Life on a canal boat is demonstrated. Nowadays, the area is 'green' rather than 'black'.

At our meeting on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> May Delia Garrott is going to be our speaker; at the time of writing she has not decided on her subject so you will have to come to the meeting to find out what it is.

## SCIENCE, NATURE & THINGS TECHNICAL GROUP

At our April meeting Ian Roberts gave an illustrated talk entitled "The Perfect Cuppa". He was very ably supported by his other half, Elaine, who produced a seemingly endless stream of sample glasses of different teas. From being for twenty years or so non tea drinkers, they have become some what connoisseurs of tea. His talk took us through what tea is and where the plants are grown, how the leaves are picked and processed. He also touched on caffeine content and the effect of differing steeping

times. The net result is, for black teas as most in Britain are, select your tea variety and brand, steep for 3 minutes at 98°C, pour into a china cup before drinking. Milk may be added if you wish and that may be either first (you are a MIFFY) or afterwards (you are a TIFFY). Strength of flavour is adjusted by varying the amount of tea, not by varying the steeping time as increasing that leads to higher caffeine content.

Our May meeting is a visit to the Glass Festival at Stourbridge on Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> May.
