We swung into the programme with Wild Bill Davis playing an electronic organ recording of "Low Bottom" which was followed by a cool rendering of "Beyond the Sea" by The Five, the calm this had induced rapidly disappeared when John Pizzarelli son of Bucky Pizzarelli, played and sang (at breakneck speed) "I've Just Seen a Face". Next in line was a version of "Chattanooga Choo Choo played and arranged by Peter Matz. Keeping ever topical (it being the September meeting) we had Jacqui Dankworth singing "September in the Rain" The next track was a Scott Joplin tune "The

Entertainer" But in this instance played by Geoff Love. To end the first half we had "C Jam Blues" followed by "Hesitating Blues" and then a rather nice version of "Have you Met Miss Jones" sung and played by jazz Pianist/singer/arranger Chris Ingham. After a very talkative half time we thundered into the second Half of the programme with The Thilo Wolf Big Band playing "It's all Right with Me" .The Count played "Duet" next and then "Airmail Special" Played by the Swinging Swedes Sextet with a great xylophone solo. The next two tracks were by Zim Zemarel and Henry Jerome (The Brazen Brass sound) before The Claude Bolling Trio set us up nicely with "It had to be you followed by an audience pleasing two tracks of "The Stripper" and "Night Train" both by David Rose and his Orchestra. I can sum up the audience reaction with "Reader you should have been there". The afternoon ended With "Li'l Darlin" played by the Count Basie Orchestra (without the late Count Basie) but with Neil Hefti leading. Interesting to note the differences.

BIG BAND MUSIC AND JAZZ GROUP

Our programme for the September Big Band, Swing and Jazz group meeting included a wide range of jazz types such as traditional, modern, experimental and really old originals chosen by Tony. He started with Hugh Laurie who is well known as an actor and comic but who has a considerable love and talent for music, particularly of New Orleans jazz. Swanee River is a lively example of his jazz piano and vocal style. Ory's Creole Trombone demonstrated how successful Louis Armstrong and Kid Ory's musical relationship was. Miles Davis and his distinctive trumpet style gave us Marmaduke. Another favourite of Tony is the

Dutch Swing College Band. Tony's modern choice was Delanay's Dilemma by the Modern Jazz Quartet. We heard that Thelonious Monk was the second most recorded jazz composer after Duke Ellington and J J Moalini was a world renowned exponent of the Bandoneon which is a sort of accordion. Albert Collins specialised in the electric blues guitar, formed his band in 1952 and started recording in 1958. Tony finished the first half with Dizzy Gillespie's Two Bass Hit.

Our second set started with Willbur De Paris whose band in the 40's featured his brother Sidney and Jelly Roll Morton. Duke Ellington followed. We then heard Turk Murphy playing Chimes Blues and Weaver & Beasley playing Bottleneck Blues. Fletcher Henderson became one of the most influential black big bands in the 20's and 30's. James Taylor is a musician who bridges the gap between Rock & Roll and Jazz. Stan Kenton's 'Willow Weep for Me' is a classic. Gerry Mulligan and Chet Baker performed Walkin' Shoes with great rapport. The afternoon finished with Benny Goodman's Bei Mir Bist Du Schon. A very long number with so many changes in tempo and style that is qualifies as two tracks! We listen to a wide range of jazz and big band swing. Some of our group are happy to put programmes together but we have no requirement to do so! Tony Badham who runs our group can always be relied upon to put an unusual programme together when no volunteers come forward. Please come and join us. HISTORY GROUP

At our October meeting Dr Lim Ho gave us an illustrated talk on a holiday that he and his wife took in China in 2007. This included a 5 day cruise along the Yangtze, the third largest river in the world, where the peaks on either side rise up to 1000 metres. They visited Fengdu, a sacred site for Taoism since the 6th century BC and Emei Shan, a centre for Buddhism. He described the Three Gorges Project where an enormous dam has been built, the largest water control in the world, which meant over 1 million people

had to be resettled and where 3 cruise ships can be fitted into one lock. Some of the sightseeing trips they took involved going up over 3,000 metres when it was recommended that they carry oxygen bottles. In Lesham, at the junction of three rivers, there is a giant statue of Buddha which took 90 years to build. Chengdu, the capital of Sichuan, is described as the city of hibiscus and pandas (an interesting fact: a panda consumes 20 kg of bamboo a day, only 20% of which is absorbed). The Jiuzhaigou National Park is another World Heritage Site with beautiful scenery. Dr Ho showed us what a fascinating contry China is - the oldest civilisation in the world with 56 different ethnic groups.

On Monday 11th November Paula Bartley is talking to us about "Prostitution in the 19th Century". All U3A members are welcome. The £1 charges includes tea and biscuits. We are now back in our usual Side Room.

SCIENCE AND NATURE GROUP

At the last minute we changed our scheduled programme and showed a DVD entitled 'Landscape Mysteries', kindly provided by Caroline. Twenty six of us were fascinated by two separate half hour programmes presented by that excellent geologist and historian Aubrey Manning. The first one was entitled 'Britain Before the Ice' and told of the finding of the skeleton of a high born young man, buried in a cave on the south western coast of Wales, that was 29,000 years old. At that time the burial site was 70

miles from the sea but because of rising sea levels was almost inundated by water when it was discovered. In a similar vein, 'Secrets of the Flood' told us about Britain when the last Ice Age melted 15,000 years ago and the weight of glacial ice, that was many hundreds of metres thick, especially over Scotland, relieved the pressure on the ground beneath it and the terrain lifted again, whilst southern Britain then sank significantly. This tilting of the land mass of Britain was responsible for the formation of the North sea, previously a land link to the Continent, and the Isle of Wight and the Solent.
