#### ALL SWING & JAZZ GROUP

Report by Mavis Pickett for Dennis Sully Report of the September 2014 Meeting.



This month's programme was slightly different from the usual in that we had a different compiler for each half. It worked well, without prior knowledge of the others programme it was impressive that there were no repetitions of either artists or tracks. The first half began with Bobby Hackett on the Cornet playing "Muskrat Ramble", this was followed by the Mills Brothers singing "Paper

Doll", wonderful close harmony and voices. Then we had not one but two tenor sax players in Gene Ammons and Sonny Stitt playing "Red Sails in the Sunset". Another vocal next with Stacey Kent with "They all Laughed". After Stan Getz played "It Never Entered my Mind" we had a 'show stopper' with Cleo Laine singing "Turkish Delight". If you thought 'scat' was the prerogative of Ella listen to this and be surprised. The programme finished with another Bobby Hackett track with him playing "BerniesTune".

The second half with our second compiler got off to a seemingly quiet start with "Tuning Up" played by Cyril Stapleton and his band. This opened with the band coming on individually and gradually built up to the climax of the whole band playing. After this it was on to New Orleans jazz with the Preservation Hall Jazz Band playing "Bill Bailey" "Chattanooga Choo Choo" followed played by Peter Matz and his Orchestra . Chris Barber followed with "Making Whoopee" featuring a lovely solo on the trumpet by Pat Halcox. Then we had a Harry James track "Tweet Tweet" with Harry on trumpet and Willie Smith on the alto sax. We then had another *interesting* track. It was "The Battersea Rain Dance" played by the Chris Barber band, when they were in Berlin in 1968. This was a radically different sound from Barber the trad player and certainly created a conversational interlude. The final set was a Tutti Camarata arrangement of "The Pink Panther" theme. It was played by a 'put together group' called Tutti's Trombones and consisted of ten trombonists. Thank you yet again Dennis for another good afternoon of music and (yes I admit it) chat.

Our next meeting is on the 27th November in the lounge of the Methodist Church Hall starting At the usual time of 2pm. All are welcome to join us.

At our October meeting we watched a DVD: "The Art of Barbara Hepworth". This DVD was skillfully narrrated in the artist's own words, giving us a very personal insight into her thoughts on her artistic interpretations and the place of an artist in the modern world. She emphasised that sculpture is "always positive" and we saw that she took inspiration from many sources, including the landscape of Yorkshire, the sea and megaliths of Cornwall, and from her observation of people in different

#### BIG BAND MUSIC AND JAZZ GROUP

From my limited selection of CD's I rediscovered the wonderful old and new big band, swing and jazz music and



compiled my presentation for our group. However, I had to borrow some CD's from Tony in order to produce the 20 tracks we normally play. I opened with Roy Palmer, a very early US jazz trombonist who was born in 1892, playing Georgia Grind. Count Basie's (One o'clock Jump) mother taught him to play the piano and he promptly dropped out of school and improvised accompaniment for silent movies in his local theatre! Fidgety Feet was a Bix Beiderbecke & the Wolverines recording. Bix was a white musician who played with black groups. He became an

alcoholic and died aged 28. Next, the John Petters Trio playing a Tribute to Gene Krupa. From Django Reinhardt and Stefan Grappelli I chose Minor Swing. Eddie Condon & his Orchestra played The Eel, such imaginative titles! Kai Winding and Jay Jay Johnson were two trombonists who played together from 1954 to 1956 and had a huge success musically and commercially. Mugsy Spanier played 'hot' jazz demonstrated by his Relaxin' at the Touro. Finished the first half with the Modern Jazz Quartet with Vendome and the Harry James Orchestra playing Two o'clock Jump. Opened the second half with Lionel Hampton, Doubling with Dublin, and Benny Goodman, Jersey Bounce. One of Tony's CD, Coco Briavil Gypsy Swing, featured 3 brothers from France whose mother was a singer in the Django entourage. Amazing sound! The Dutch Swing College Band are a traditional Dixieland band founded in 1945 by Peter Schilperoot who led the band for more than 45 years. Milestones played by Miles Davis, was my next choice. Had to include Louis Armstrong (Mahogany Hall Stomp) followed by Sidney Bechet (Maryland my Maryland). Back to early days jazz with Jelly Roll Morton's Red Hot Peppers playing Kansas City Stomp. Mary L Williams played piano at age 6 and was a much married amazing jazz pianist, composer and arranger who wrote hundreds of compositions. I chose Baby Dear played by her Kansas City Seven. Finished with Benny Goodman and his Sextet playing On the Alamo.

We meet on the 4<sup>th</sup> Tuesday of the month from 2 – 4pm at the Methodist Church. Some of our group are happy to put a programme together but there is no requirement to do so! Tony Badham, who runs our group, can always be relied upon to put together an unusual programme when no-one volunteers. Please come and join us.

At our October meeting Tony Whiteley spoke to us about "Aspects of the Great War". The Dene Valley U3A have been researching the lives and deaths of servicemen whose names are recorded on war memorials in village in the local area. Six teams from the Great War in Villages Group concentrated on particular villages, such as Ettington, Combrook, Hampton Lucy. Various sources were used, such as Record Offices, local newspapers and census details; they also studied the

reports of officers who had witnessed the actions of servicemen and who, in many cases, recommended the award of medals in recognition of their heroism. The area covered is a farming area and many of the servicemen were stable lads, grooms and footmen who came from large families. Tony gave us details of particular individuals one of whom, Robert Emmett, was a great great-nephew of the Irish patriot of the same name who was executed by the British for treason. He gave up his American nationality and built Moreton Paddox, which subsequently became a military hospital. Another American, Arthur Tree, built Ashorne Hall.

Tony concluded by playing the last poignant scene from Richard Attenborough's film "Oh, what a lovely war", where the soldiers sing their version of the Jerome Kern song "We'll never tell them".

On Monday 10<sup>th</sup> November Mairi McDonald is talking to us about the Gunpowder Plot. This should be very interesting as several of the perpetrators had links to our area. Please join us.


