## HISTORY GROUP

At our October meeting Dr Bob Bearman treated us to an interesting talk about Stratford resident Marie Corelli (1855-1924). She was considered a legend in her lifetime. A first edition of her book could sell out in a day. Her readers ranged from Queen Victoria to ordinary folk and at the height of her success she was the best selling and most highly paid author in England. The talk, however, was not about her writing but about her work as a pioneer and conservationist.

Marie Corelli was the first person to make a case for conservation in Stratford but she is somewhat remembered for her eccentricities - boating on the Avon in her gondola, rather than her achievements. She took on the powerful citizens who had vested interests in the town sometimes using the national press to highlight the issue. She openly criticised the development of the town, members of the town council, the Birthplace trustees, and took up the cause of protecting Shakespeare's legacy, opened fêtes and discovered a talent for public speaking. In 1910 she gifted Firs gardens to the town to prevent the destruction of the old trees and preserve the open spaces. Harvard House is perhaps one of the most notable examples of Marie's determination to preserve the old buildings of Stratford.

Bob rounded off the talk by saying that despite her faults Marie Corelli was one of the first true conservationists, a pioneer who deserves affection and respect from those labouring in the protection of the environment.
