A great start to the afternoon with Doc Severinsen playing us in with "Love for Sale", keeping to the 'loving theme' Chris Barber and his band played "I can't give you anything but love" with Ottilie Patterson soloing. (personal opinion here - I don't think her voice and treatment of songs was ever appreciated enough). OK off the soapbox and straight into swing with Les Brown followed by the

New Orleans style of Armand Hug and his jazz men. Next in line was Tutti Camarata. Known principally as an arranger but listening to him play "I can't get started" was a joy. Penultimate track on first half was "Good Old Bosom Bread" by Hot Lips Page. This has a story attached but space doesn't allow it to be told but ask Dennis he will tell you. Conclusion of side 1 was "S'wonderful" played by Nobuo Hara and his Sharps and Flats. He is a Japanese saxophonist now aged 80 and still touring his band round the world. BIG BAND MUSIC AND JAZZ GROUP

For this month's program Tony tried to include something from all the various genre of what we call jazz, from early original blues to be-bop and swing! He opened with Samuel John Lightnin' Hopkins who was born in Texas in 1912 and was considered by some to have captured the original mood and poetry of blues. We then heard Duke Ellington's Caravan. Willie (The Lion) Smith (born 1893) was a brilliant 'stride pianist' and his rendition of Finger Buster proves the point. Clarence Williams (born 1893) was another pianist who became the first black American music publisher. In 1943 he sold his

extensive back catalogue to Decca for \$50,000 and retired. Teddy Wilson was one of the first black musicians to perform with a white band when he joined the Benny Goodman Quartet in 1935. Blind Willie Johnson was primarily a gospel singer and had wanted to be a preacher. Charlie Parker was a jazz saxophonist who embraced many different styles from blues to be-bop. Tony finished the first set with two of his favourites, Stephane Grappelli and Lional Hampton. Second set opened with Lester Young who mostly played tenor sax and clarinet but could also play trumpet, drums and violin. Bob Crosby, brother of Bing, was also a singer who built his career fronting a number of big bands. Bunny Berigan was a renowned swing trumpeter but lost his battle with alcoholism at 33. Les Brown and his Band of Renown lasted almost 70 years to 2001 and the band is now led by Les Brown Jr. Charlie Barnet was most famous for his recordings of Cherokee and Skyliner in the 40's. Tony thought he had better include a UK band so chose Chris Barber! We finished the afternoon with Dave Brubeck playing The Trolley Song, Earl Hines on the piano with Father Steps In, Fletcher Henderson with Limehouse Blues and Glenn Miller with Pagan Love Song.

We meet on the 4th Tuesday of the month from 2 – 4pm at the Methodist Church. Some of our group are happy to put a programme together but there is no requirement to do so! Tony Badham, who runs our group, can always be relied upon to put together an unusual programme when no-one volunteers. Please come and join us.

HISTORY GROUP Sheela Burchill



At our last meeting Edwin Lilly gave us an illustrated talk on the Romans in Britain and what can be seen now. Edwin has travelled extensively visiting Roman remains and showed us some very interesting photographs and maps. Julius Caesar first invaded Britain in 55BC and again the following year, but it was not until 43AD that the Emperor Claudius led a full-scale invasion, bringing with him 4 legions and auxiliaries - about 40,000 in total. There was fierce resistance, particularly

from the Iceni tribe led by their queen, Boudicca, but eventually the mighty power of the Romans won the day. As recalcitrant tribes were pushed back towards the frontiers of Scotland and Wales, the Romans built forts and barracks, amphitheatres, baths, temples and basilicas; as well as London, cities and towns were developed such as York, Chester, Gloucester, Bath, Lincoln, Chichester. Britain was quite a wealthy country exporting goods such as grain, tin and silver. Many of today's major routes are based on Roman roads which were generally built of gravel. Britain remained a relatively untroubled outpost of the Roman Empire during the 4th century, by which time the empire itself was beginning to disintegrate with the Roman Army having to fight various wars on the European continent. By 410 AD all the Romans had left, leaving the Britons to look to their own defence. Some of the notable Roman sites still to be seen are Hadrian's Wall, the amphitheatre at Caerleon, Bignor and Chedworth villas, Fishbourne Palace, York and Chester walls, Housesteads fort, the Roman baths in Bath.
