Report of July 2014 meeting.
I have always been interested in the vibrant swing and jazz scene in Sweden, especially during the period from 1900 to 1960. So I thought it would be nice to play this month (July) a mix of Swedish, English (are we in the European Union or not?), European and American swing and jazz. The Swedish swing and jazz scene was enhanced by the many top class non-Swedish musicians who visited and played in Sweden. Artists like Duke Ellington, Count Basie, Quincy Jones, Roy Eldridge, Stan Getz and many, many others.

So the first half of our programme included "Summertime" played by Expressen Elite Orkester, with vocal by Gunnar Nilson. Artists like The Quintette of the Hot Club of France, Washboard Serenaders, Jan Allan Quartet, Budd Johnson and others played their swing and jazz numbers. A multi-talented instrumentalist and singer Valaida Snow sang and played "I Wish I Were Twins" followed by "If I Were a Bell" played by Anders Burman Sextet who took us to the interval.

After tea and biscuits, our second half of the programme began with a swinging Jam Session, superbly played by eight or more well-known American swing and Jazz artists. The Buddy DeFranco Quartet played "Star Eyes" with the Swedish Charlie Norman Quintet then playing "Boogie Woogie on St Louis Blues". The Simon Brehms Orkester, Bunta's Jazz Band, the BBC Big Band strutted their stuff, followed by Stan Getz playing with a Swedish Group "Oh Farmland, You're Fair". Gosta Torens Orkester played Jazz Me Blues, and our programme ended with Roy Eldridge and a Swedish group playing "The Heat is On".

 Tony produced another interesting selection of jazz and swing for our meeting opening with Ray Charles who was famous for his jazz and blues vocals at the piano. Organ Grinders Swing was played by Jimmie Lunceford's band. Next, another favourite, Snake Rag played by King Olivers Creole Jazz Band. Benny Goodman is a favourite of Tony's and we heard his band playing On the Alamo. Oscar Peterson, playing Flying Home, is one of the few 'long lived' jazz men with a 60 year career playing piano. We all know that the Modern Jazz Quartet is another of Tony's favourites and we are learning to like them, this time playing The Queen's Fancy. However, he has only just discovered that all the members of the band are no longer with us! They were followed in complete contrast with Glenn Millers Band playing Tuxedo Junction. David reminded us that he met Glenn in London in 1944. Harry James was a great trumpet player this time featuring Esrellita (Little Star). Coco Briaval are a gypsy family group with a Django-like sound. Tony found the CD on a market stall in France! We finished the first set with Norwegian Wood played by Acker Bilk. The Dutch Swing College Band opened the second set with Do you know what it means to... Tommy Dorsey playing Moonlight in Vermont, Lionel Hampton playing Chop-Chop and Woody Herman playing Blue Flame were all 'greats' of the jazz era. We were reminded that Chris Barber, playing High Society, had tremendous influence on developing the careers of many others such as Lonnie Donegan, Kenny Ball and Monty Sunshine. We then heard an unusual slow heavy piano number played by S Kessler. A CD Tony picked up on his travels in France! This was followed by some modern jazz. Old Devil Moon, played by Miles Davis. Ken Colyer is another traditional jazz man and his Gettysburg March comes from some lost 1954 tapes. We finished with two big bands, Artie Shaw with Begin the Beguine and Syd Lawrence playing Frenesi. We meet on the 4th Tuesday of the month from 2 – 4pm at the Methodist Church. Some of our group are happy to put a programme together but there is no requirement to do so! Tony Badham, who runs our group, can always be relied upon to put together an unusual programme when no-one volunteers. Please come and join us.

GAMES GROUP


