Parish Chairman Barry Davolls writes....

Goodbye Peggie

Peggie was one of the first villagers I met on my arrival in Lopen in 2007 which coincided with the run up to the local Council elections to be held in May. A knock on the door (the loudest to this day!) and I was face to face with a Councillor-in-waiting insisting I give her my vote. To this day I chuckle over our first meeting which I imagine was similar to being tango'd. From that point on and even before working with her as a fellow Councillor, the tone was set. Any issue of local concern or where assistance was required, I would be brow beaten into action. This is what you got with Peggie, full-on commitment whether you liked it or not! I grew to like being tango'd whether it was over Council business or the regular cups of coffee we shared at her house and I know I am going to miss it. It's an indisputable fact that Peggie, whether through the Council, or as an individual, was instrumental in bringing about tangible benefits for us all. Thank you Peggie and enjoy your new home!

Councillor Vacancy

Peggie's departure leaves a Parish Councillor vacancy to fill. We have to follow a statutory procedure to see if ten or more local residents wish the vacancy be filled by holding an election rather than co-option. This notice has already been posted on the notice board and the call for election expires the 8th October. Only then (assuming there is no call for election) can we start to consider co-option. Our target is to co-opt at our scheduled meeting in November and we will formally advertise the vacancy with a clear cut-off date yet to be established. If you wish to know exactly what is involved in being a Councillor (which in our case is not particularly arduous) or any other aspect of the Council, please do not hesitate to contact me. As an overview, the Council formally meets around eight times a year including extraordinary meetings, with the duration of meetings spanning thirty minutes to two and a half hours. There is low level activity and correspondence between meetings, generally via email and phone. Councillors are each given a special role on which to lead and the new Councillor role will be discussed and agreed with the individual appointed. Training is available. We welcome approaches from anyone in the village to join us.

Health and Wellbeing Grant?

Cllr. Le Hardy (our County Councillor) has announced a £5,000 grant fund has been allocated to each County Councillor to help develop local activities that promote health and wellbeing in their area. Grants can be awarded from £250 upwards to local community groups and organisations, for example parish councils and voluntary groups. The idea of the fund is to encourage people, families and communities to take more responsibility for their own health and wellbeing, and to support projects that improve people's health in a variety of ways.

If you have any suggestions for Lopen, please make contact with me. Lopen was successful in bidding from last year's fund to obtain money towards a defibrillator for the Village and this project is ongoing.

Flood Mitigation Fund - update

Somerset County Council has just announced a fund that aims to provide grants for flood alleviation schemes across Somerset. The fund pot is £200,000 and is aimed at Town/Parish Councils, landowners and residents in Somerset who are invited to apply for works that will help reduce the risk of flooding. They are looking for schemes that can help a community increase its resilience against flooding such as creating flood defence banks, clearing roadside ditches or increasing the size of piped access crossings on a watercourse. Whilst anyone can apply, priority will be given to schemes put forward by Town and Parish Councils. Any scheme proposed **must** be supported by, in our case, Lopen Parish Council.
