For Watford and Three Rivers Children

The Bowley Charity was founded in 1951 by Mrs Ethel Bowley to help deprived children living in south west Hertfordshire.

Over the years the Bowley Charity has helped thousands of families, originally with food and fuel, more recently with white goods, children's furniture and equipment.

Who is eligible for a grant?

Disadvantaged children aged 0-16 years, and 17-18 years in full time education who are permanently housed or have a secure offer of housing in Watford or Three Rivers. Unborn babies within 3 months of due date.

What items are funded?

Children's furniture such as cots, beds, bunk beds, clothes storage units. Baby equipment e.g. buggies. White goods that will ultimately benefit a child e.g. cookers, fridge-freezers, washing machines.

These items are <u>not</u> funded: tumble dryers, fitted flooring, computers/laptops, school uniform, school trips, car seats. Living room furniture and bedroom furniture for parents/carers is not usually prioritised.

Who can apply?

A grant application form must be fully completed on behalf of the family by a practitioner (such as a social worker, health visitor or support worker) who:

- a) knows the family and their current circumstances; and
- b) has recently visited the family home and can describe why a grant and the particular item(s) are needed.

How much is granted?

The aim is to help as many families as possible within the funds available. There is no upper or lower limit. In 2015-16, £11,380 was distributed between 52 families.

Grants are normally made in the form of Argos vouchers based on reasonablypriced items in the catalogue that meet the described need. The cost of delivery of large items is funded where necessary. The submitted applications are considered four times a year, normally in March, June, September and December. The closing dates for submission of applications are displayed on the website.

The trustees meet to consider the grant applications two weeks after each closing date. The referring practitioners normally receive notification of the outcomes and the vouchers within a week of the meetings.

Examples of help given

- A mother raising six children on her own was helped to get a new washing machine when her old one broke down.
- A grant to a 16 year old student who could not live at home enabled him to buy bedding and a microwave oven for his bedsit.
- A young family fleeing domestic abuse was helped to buy beds for the children.
