Dear People,

The Catholic press carries reports of the words spoken by Pope Francis on Armistice Day, and pilgrims in St Peter's Square heard his appeal against war and war-mongering besides the sadness for those who died during the war.

What he said is in what Fr Frank Daly said at Hinckley. Those of you who read the Leicester Mercury will know what the front page headlines were on Tuesday last, and you will have read the full report on the inside pages, including the full text of Fr Frank's words. The Mercury was fair, quoting those who agreed and disagreed with Fr Frank, on his message, the occasion, his audience. He would be challenged more than Pope Francis would be.

To remember the horrors of war at the same time as remembering the bravery of those who had to die is not wrong. To criticise the lack of reverence for life in the way battles are fought is not wrong. The sadness and horror of war is that people are killed and kill under orders from those who hold power. Wilfred Owen, probably the best-know and best-loved English war poet, who died as a serving soldier just two days before the Armistice in 1918, wrote one of the finest lines of war poetry: *"The old men sent the young men to die."* This needs to be remembered by all of us.

Would you be a concientious objector, refusing to kill under any circumstances? Would you spit at such a man after coming out of mass on Sunday? Sad details in the Catholic press of the way our people and our bishops were in World War I and of how our bishops supported and encouraged the war. Google Cardinal Bourne to read what he and other bishops said at that time. Not until the Vatican Council, 1962-65, did the Catholic Church officially recognise the right to concientious objection.

The Church is always of its time, the people of God in the present age. When we look back at the sometimes spiritual and social blindness of our popes and bishops we know that a future age will look at us and wonder how we could possibly countenance the injustices, poverty, hunger, destitution, refugees and asylum seekers, war-mongering, arms' sales and weapons of mass destruction. We are of our time. We cringe at the defects of our Church and some of its leaders and its members. The news coming from the Birminghan Archdiocese on the inquiry into child abuse is a reminder that all human authority is defective. Sometimes our Church authorities have failed us very badly, smiling reassuringly as truths are hidden: but the hurts for the failed people last forever, hard to forgive.

May God bless us and help us to heal and to forgive,


