West Ham Park Vegetable Garden

At the end of February and beginning of March 2020 the West Ham Park vegetable garden was thriving. There were five regulars at our Tuesday afternoon sessions. We were working in close co-operation with Andrea, a park employee, who had drawn up an outline-planting plan, so there was some idea of what we wished to put and where. Lucy, the park manager had asked us to set up a Saturday session in the garden for 7th March. This we did and all our regulars came along. We had a number of visitors including several mothers with young children; we were very pleased to be able to explain what we were doing and show off the garden. Then, of course the lockdown was announced. As several of our number are vulnerable to the virus, or live with people who are, it was inevitable that they would decide that the risk was too great to spend any





time in the garden. Others of us found that the garden was actually a convenient place to self-isolate, as there was much less chance of a random encounter with a member of the public. And so we managed to sow virtually all of what we had planned to sow. A number of plants had been pre grown in pots and so had a head start. One of the challenges was the lack of rain in the last half of April which necessitated frequent watering. Fortunately since we now had a tap on site this was made easier for us. We also found ourselves answering various queries including how to set up a wormery and looking after a baby squirrel!

Thanks to Lucy and Andrea and all the other staff in the park for planning and encouragement and to Pat and Helen, Su and Alan, Jan and Dawn for all their hard work both before and after the lockdown. Here's to a successful vegetable garden when things get back to whatever normality will be afterwards!



Doctor Fothergill

We have received a grant from the City of London to make a permanent exhibition of our project "The Legacy of Dr Fothergill", and this will be installed in the Rose Garden, probably next summer. It includes historical information, maps and beautiful Eighteenth Century botanical drawings. We will hold an event to launch the exhibition and show you where to see the plants and flowers in today's garden.



thanking staff for keeping the park open brightened our day, well month really. It has been an interesting challenge to manage the park during a global pandemic - we have closed facilities as instructed and created new walking routes around the gardens to direct the flow of people who visit daily to see the gardens as they come alive with blossom and summer flowers.

Closing time has been maintained at 6:30pm due to a reduced number of staff working because of the virus. The park becomes busier in the afternoon and we were having issues with visitors not following government guidance. The Safer Neighbourhood teams and Met Police have been a brilliant support and have been regularly patrolling the park on sunny afternoons to enforce government guidelines to move people on, keep numbers within the park manageable and enable us to stay open.

Our office is closed but our team are working away behind the scenes... before lockdown began we consulted on the detailed design for the playground refurbishment project. Comments regarding gate entrances, provision of shade, fence height, bin provision were all incorporated





into the design which is due to be submitted to Newham Council for planning approval in June. Funding applications have also been submitted. We are doing our best to keep the project on track and hope to still be able to this winter and have a new playground ready for opening in 2021, but will keep you updated as things progress.

We were also intending on holding engagement sessions regarding the future of the nursery site between March and May, however this has obviously not been possible. We are hoping to be in a position to carry this out later this autumn. Other events and activities that we had planned for spring and early summer have also been cancelled.

Following on from Mondays announcement by the Prime Minister we have been looking into reopening some of our sporting facilities, following guidance from the Government as well as our sporting partners such as the Law Tennis Association. We will hopefully have the tennis courts open and some one-on-one coaching from TennisCome True happening from Saturday 16th May. Courts can be booked via clubspark.lta.org.uk/WestHamPark. All other facilities are currently closed.
