A message to the voluntary and community sector

24 funders, £80 million, I message...

In early 2011 a group of funding organisations met for the first time in Cambridge to share their experiences and examine how they could work more closely together to maximise their investment across the East of England. This initial meeting was held in response to challenging economic conditions and funding cuts that threatened local voluntary and community sector development.

Those funders have continued to meet informally and the group has now grown to 24 organisations with a joint annual investment of more than £80million into the charitable sector here in the East.

The purpose of this short publication is to confirm that despite the current economic downturn we are still open for business and that funding is available for organisations and projects that make a real difference to our communities and the lives of local people. In fact many funders have actually increased the amount of money that they have available in recognition of the tough times that the sector is facing.

The funders listed on the following pages are of various sizes, with some operating on a national basis whilst others target specific counties or geographic areas. They include lottery distributors, foundations, financial institutions, charitable trusts, even government departments and offer a range of practical and financial support including both grant funding and loans.

Awards ranging from just a few hundred to hundreds of thousands of pounds are available to support groups, organisations and individuals that meet local need, provide new experiences and change lives.

Since 1996 it has invested nearly £20 million of grant funding to local voluntary and community organisations across Essex, Southend and Thurrock and has built an endowment fund of £20 million which will benefit future generations of Essex residents.

Foundation East works on a not-for-profit basis providing loans of up to £50,000 to enterprises based in Eastern England, who have been unable to obtain funding from traditional sources. Every application is judged on its own merits and funds can also be provided which match grant capital.

Foundation East is also a delivery partner for the 'Start Up Loans for Young People' initiative, offering young entrepreneurs a loan for up to five years at 6% interest, together with free business mentoring and is at the heart of the Community Land Trust initiative providing a professional advice and project development service.

The Harpur Trust aims to inspire and support people in the Borough of Bedford to improve their lives. It does this through its grants programme, its work with schools (it owns four independent schools and sponsors one academy) and by providing sheltered accommodation for older people.

Applicant organisations must hold less than 12 months of reserves and grants are made appropriate to the size and needs of the charity.

Central grants offer funding of up to £10,000 (for capital or revenue projects) to help disadvantaged people through either financial capability or education and training. The Community Plus programme offers grants of up to £5,000 and nominations can be made by visiting any branch of Santander. The only criteria are that it must be for a local charity or local project of a larger charity and of benefit to local disadvantaged people.

WREN

WREN is a not-for-profit organisation which provides grants under the Landfill Communities Fund Scheme, on behalf of FCC Environment. Any constituted not-for-profit organisation (including Councils) may apply, for grants to improve or create play areas, village halls, recreation ground projects, nature reserves etc.

Geographical restrictions apply and projects must be within 10 miles of an active FCC Environment landfill site (see www.wren.org.uk/apply/distcalc). Funding of between £2,000 and £75,000 can be applied for. Prior discussion with WREN staff is encouraged and there are 4 publicised application deadlines per calendar year.
