LETTER FROM THE ARCHDEACON

A good read for the summer?

wonder if you are the sort of person who loves to get stuck into a book or two over the summer. "Well, choose carefully because you can't judge a book by its cover" - that's what I was told as a schoolboy. A rapid glance at my bookshelf will confirm that theory - *Power*. *Corruption and Pies* is nothing to do with sinister ambitions in the catering industry; *Has Keele Failed?* is not an account of shortcomings at the motorway service station; *You Can't Play the Game If You Don't Know the Rules* does not even mention lineouts, rucks or mauls.

Actually, I'm always rather relieved that you can't judge a book by its cover. All of us at some stage put on a front, and most of us have moments that we are really not proud of – private and locked away from public viewing. But God knows us as we are. He sees the cover and reads the book. He writes the preface ... witnesses our introduction ... pays close attention to every turn of the page ... and is still engrossed by the epilogue and the bibliography. In other words, he is our unfailingly close companion from cover to cover

To our shame, we sometimes never get further than judging the cover. Samuel (in the Bible) rightly observes that "men and women look at the outward appearance, but the Lord looks at the heart". What a relief. God sees us as we are and still loves us. Like the patient and long-suffering father in the story of the Prodigal Son, God knows that there have been times when we have messed up and pushed him to one side, but still he longs for our homecoming. He runs to meet us when we are still a dot on the horizon. He's read Volume I and longs to start Volume 2.

Take a leaf out of God's book - don't judge by the outward appearance. He is unfailingly patient as we blunder through the pages of our story, so let's take that same attitude with those around us. I heard a missionary tell the story of the time he arrived at a church carrying his motorbike helmet and showing a shaved head and an arm-full of tattoos. He was coming to speak to a church gathering. He did not immediately introduce himself but asked the person who was welcoming people at the door whether he was in the right place for the event. "Yes, there is something on this evening," she replied, looking at him suspiciously, "but I don't think it's for people like you." Ouch! In the Bible, we are (thankfully) forbidden from judging others. Leave it to God. He sees the cover and knows every word of the book.

Meanwhile, let's have the patience and the grace not to judge a book by its cover. Happy reading!

A CAUTIOUS RE-OPENING OF OUR CHURCH.

The PCC have accepted the churchwardens plan for a partial reopening of our church for private prayer within the Corona Guidelines.

We hope that from Sunday 28th June the church will be open for four days to Wednesday 1st July. It will then be closed for three days which is a recognised "break period" of any Covid infection before reopening the next Sunday (5st). This cycle will hopefully repeat, with four days open and three closed. LOCKDOWN CORNER

AN ADMONITION TO GUGGLERS, GULLERS, WHINERS, TOTERS, YELLERS, SCREEKERS AND SNUFF-TAKERS

In May we considered what our forebears sang in church. This month we look at how badly they sang it. Writing in 1676, Thomas Mace lamented the abysmal quality of music in churches:

how miserably the Prophet David's Psalma are...torfurd' or tormented, and the Service of God dishonoured, made course, or ridiculous thereby..... I will say no more to that particular, nor rubb that sore place. Only thus much I will pressume to say.... it were far better never to sing at all in Churches or in God's Service, than to sing out of Tune: that is, not in Harmonical Conchord or Agreement.

It is clear that Mace viewed poor tuning as the bane of parochial psalmody. Worse, people actually defended the status quo. He did not hold back in his scom:

If you will Sing well and in Tune, the first thing you are to do is to take the advice of St Paul which is to teach and admonish one another, as before he has directed you unto... This is his advice and counsel: and if it be worth any thing take notice of it: but if you think it be not worth noting, continue still in your ignorance, but yet speak plainly and out-right what you think, viz. that St. Paul's counsel is not worth a Rush, and that you care not a pin for it: Plain dealing's a Jewel you know; and this would be far better so to say, and make an end of the business and trouble, than to guggle and gull or sooth up your selves in a false shew, Hypocritically seeming to approve of his counsel, in doing of some slight things scurvily, which please your own lazie humours, and are things of little labour and small cost.



The sometimes splenetic, never dull, always entertaining Mace was not quite finished.

The standard of music in the service of the church has fallen, to the stage where it is now regarded by most men-including many learned and pious people—an inferior-low-slighted-undervalu'd-regardless-despicableneedless Thing, and not at all thought fit to be brought into the House and Service of God... Tis sad to hear what whining, toting, yelling or screeking there is in many Country Congregations, as if the people were affinghted, or distracted.

It is hardly surprising, if church music was seen as of little value, that not everyone bothered to join in the singing. A certain Dr. Cave asked rhetorically "if any one should step into a church while the psalm is singing, would he not find the greater part of the congregation totally inattentive? Irreverently sitting, talking to each other, taking snuff, winding up their watches, or adjusting their apparel?"

Seventy years later, a clergyman could still be found lamenting that "The rich do not sing, the poor dare not, whilst those who resolutely make the effort soon find their voices grow tremulous from being solitary in the work of praise."

Oh dear. Still, we can at least take comfort from the fact that mid-service snuff-taking has all but died out in the Benefice.

The "Going Well" has gone! We are redundant; No chance of jobs and money's running out; With outlook bleak and daily getting bleaker It's time to ask what life is all about.
