# THE RECTOR'S LETTER

#### Love is about more than romance.

February is the month when a lot of people think about love; well, actually, they often think about romance and that isn't what love is really all about. Don't get me wrong. I like a bit of romance, it can be the spark that ignites love and as a couple you need to make sure you keep the romance alive in your relationship, but love is about more

relationship, but love is about more than just romance, and love can flourish without love hearts, teddy bears and helium balloons.

When a couple marry in church they make their vows to each other - not vows they have written, yows that are there in the church's order of service: those vows mix both the romantic with the painfully realistic; "to have and to hold...to love and to cherish...for richer, for poorer, in sickness and in heath." Love as a couple is indeed about sharing a romantic Valentines meal (Dine in for 2 probably this year) but it is also about managing the finances through times of furlough or redundancy as well as caring for your loved one when they fall ill or as you grow old together.

Love is about more than romance, love is about intense and passionate care. Love is sacrificial.

Most often quoted on Remembrance Sunday, the Bible records Jesus telling us in John 15:13 that "Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends." Whilst not being about war per se, in a sense Jesus was talking about a battle – he was referring to his forthcoming death on the cross where he would defeat sin and death on our behalf because he loves us - he reminds us of the sacrificial nature of love; if we really love someone then we will freely give things up for them.

Out of love, we have all given up so much over the last year to save the NHS and to protect lives but that time of sacrifice is not yet over. We still need to stay at home, sacrifice the freedoms that we had grown used to and behave in such a way that we put others first until it is safe for us to ease back into what we used to call "normal life".

As part of that we in the Knightley benefice, along with most of the rest of the churches in Peterborough Diocese, have closed our buildings; not because it gives the clergy an easier life - trust me, online worship is a lot harder work and lot more time consuming than leading services in the buildings is -but because we love you. We love the people in our villages, in our communities; our friends, neighbours, folks we see when walking the dog or in the local pub or at the school gate, even those of you we've never met, and we don't want our church

buildings to have any chance of becoming hubs of infection and putting you at risk.

But, as I say, we haven't closed down and gone into hibernation, we have moved online and that's great in lots of ways because it gives you the opportunity to see what church is like, to hear what the "new" vicar has to say about life, faith, God and Christianity in a twenty-first century locked-down village all from the comfort of your own lounge without having to set foot in a building, and in addition, because we use YouTube for most of our services, no-one will ever know that you've visited if you would rather not say.

#### BENEFICE WEATHER REPORT 2020

Once again we are indebted to Edgar Mobbs of Newnham, Claire Hoare of Little Preston, and June Pound of Charwelton for submitting their weather records for our interest.

As usual Charwelton was the wettest village in 2020 with 955mm recorded, closely followed by Newnham on 925mm, with Little Preston trailing well behind at 713mm. Presumably that is something to do with LP being on a hill.

Newnham reports that its average rainfall over the last 29 years is 795mm per year.

In 2020 October was the second wettest month over those 29 years (the wettest being April 2012 with 170mm) and October - December was the 4th. wettest quarter at 353mm. Overall 2020 has been the 5th. wettest year - the highest annual rainfall having been in 2012 with 1100mm.

May 2020 was the driest month of the year at only 6mm, while the driest month of all was June 2018 with 2.3mm.

A similar pattern, both for this year and over the longer term, has been the case with Charwelton (records going back to 1993) and Little Preston (back to 2004), with Charwelton having the distinction (is that the right word?) of being consistently the wettest of the three villages. It is also the village in which the effects of that rainfall are most noticeable, with the main road (and in particular the pub!) being regularly flooded. Indeed, looking out of my study window as I write, that all looks set to be happening again.

At the other end of the scale the driest year was 2005 with only 517 mm rain, and the driest months were June 2006 and March 2011 each having only 2.5mm rain.

Charwelton has also sent in some temperature figures. The mean daytime temperature in 2020 was 12.37°C with the hottest month being August at 20.35°C, while the hottest day of the year was 12 Aug when the temperature reached 30°C. The coldest month was March with a mean minimum temp. of 0.77°C. There was nearly a week of sub-zero temperatures that month.

#### CHURCH OPENING, IT IS SUNDAYS ONLY

Your Churchwardens report that 'it has been a dilemma to plan our openings in the safest possible way for the very many people involved, some of whom are inevitably shielding or vulnerable in their various ways. We tightened our corona safety from the January 4th lockdown and when the aggressive variant of the virus came to the fore, because we have a heavy responsibility to our visitors, key holders, cleaners, clock winder, flower arrangers, officers, worshippers and not least our Rector, to make your church as safe as possible. The only solution currently practicable for us, short of total closure, is to open one day per week only, on Sundays, so that the longest quarantine applies

between openings to kill any infection, and without exposure of anyone to the risks of disinfection work."

#### THE CHURCH ELECTORAL ROLL

## ANNUAL VESTRY AND PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

This will take place on Friday 26th March 2021 at 4.00 pm in the Church, regulations permitting. It is the meeting when our church officers and PCC are appointed for another year. Everyone is welcome to attend, but only those on the Church Electoral Roll for the parish can vote. See above. Meeting papers are delivered to all on the Roll

#### PLANNED GIVING

The new year is a good time to review our own 'tithing' or personal level of financial support for your church. Please review your giving and whether it should be adjusted for inflation, or personal circumstances. This year our parish share which we owe to the Diocese and pays for our Rector, has increased to roughly £12000 per annum.

With all running costs of the Church account close to £18000 per annum, it equates to £210 a year for every household here, or £4 per house per week, year after year! Please can everyone do their bit to share this and help ensure we meet our costs in full. Our Hon Treasurer, Elizabeth Dearns [contact details on page 15] will be pleased to help anyone with the paperwork for tax efficient giving, so that Gift Aid of effectively 25% is added to one's giving and comes back to the church.

The PCC extends a big thank you to all our regular donors. All planned giving is treated in strict confidence.

#### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

After a socially-distanced meeting in a member's garden in July last year. Preston Capes WI has been meeting virtually via Zoom every month since then. However, with the vaccine being rolled out and hopefully a relaxation in Covid regulations over the next few months, we hope to be back to face-to-face meetings in the village hall sometime after Easter.

To compensate for the lack of meetings last year. subscriptions have been extended by three months and those for this year will not now be due until April. #### BYFIFI D MEDICAL CENTRE

Last year, we carried out a remarkably successful mass flu vaccination programme. During this time. we jabbed just under 3000 patients, including those over 50 years of age free for the first time although there was an incredibly low uptake from this group despite text messages being sent. Our plans for Covid-19 vaccinations will we hope, for the Oxford/Astra Zeneca, follow the same pattern, as soon as stock is made available to us, such we will start to roll out in the order established by the government. We ask for your continued patience

Invitations to have the vaccine have started to be sent out. The over 80 age group are being targeted first, and the vaccinations are taking place at Weedon Medical Centre. Anyone with a known history of severe allergies will not be invited to have the current vaccine. Please do not call Byfield Medical Centre asking to book an appointment, text invitations are being sent to those with mobile phones, for those without a mobile COVID calls are being made to the patient's landline. This will be a long process each person being vaccinated will have to have two doses, so two separate appointments.

Please do NOT add to their workload by ringing the surgery. They will contact you, If you need to cancel and booked online, cancel online, otherwise ring Weedon Medical Centre not Byfield
