THE RECTOR'S LETTER

"Happy New Year!"

I seem to remember saying that on the first of January 2020 – it didn't quite work out, did it?

On the one hand the first of January is a day like all others, it is simply the nominal start of a new cycle around the sun and yet it is a day that we invest a lot in and we pin a lot of hopes on – it's the start of a New Year: a fresh

 beginning, a new start! And so we tell ourselves, this year will be different, better, brighter as we base our hopes on appirations, dreams and desires because this will be the year 1 get a good job, find love or we beat Covid-19.

And so we cross our fingers, pop a cork, sing Auld Lang Syne and hope for the best.

"Well, you're a fine one to talk," you're thinking, "a Vicar. A Christian, you put all your hope in a fairy tale ; a baby in a manger that we will be packing away any day now for another twelve months."

Except that the Bible tells us that the Christian hope is not like that.

Just as we don't hope for things that realistically won't happen, the Bible also makes the point that no-one actually hopes for what they already have, so Christians hope is all about something wonderful that is to come, but its not a foolish hope, rather it is a "living hope" as God's Word puts it. That means that this isn't a hope based on a child who was born 2000 years ago, who lived and then died, but rather the Christian hope is in Jesus because, on the cross, he conquered sin and death and then rose again heralding not just a New Year, but the promise of a New Eternity to all those who put their faith in him.

On January 1st, we might hope that this will be a "Happy New Year" because we'll get the vaccine soon, or because "that promotion" will come up, or "that wonderful person" will finally notice you but there are a lot of variables involved in those hopes. In contrast, the Christian hope is sure and certain, not because

we have done anything to ensure it will happen, but because God has done everything to guarantee our hope. As Paul puts it in his New Testament letter to the Roman Christians;

"Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God."

That is real incredible accessible hope that is available to all of us this year, this day, this minute.

As we begin a New Year, let's put our hope for the future into safe hands and during this month at our church services we are going to begin a series looking at the book of Colossians in the Bible and why Christianity is such an amazing faith, so why not come along or watch them online at www.knightleybenefice.org.uk and, as Paul goes on to write, "May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit." Romans 15:13

Following the purchase of the village defibrillator by the Parish it is now commissioned and secure in its external locked cabinet, to the left of the red telephone book-swop kiosk, outside the village hall. Many thanks to Chris Jones for the installation.

Let's hope it is never needed, but if there is an emergency, the procedure is to ring 999 and the ambulance service will give guidance until paramedics arrive, including giving the code for the cabinet if they feel appropriate.

The cabinet is checked weekly to ensure it is fit for purpose, and CPR (Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation) training is planned when it is safe to do so. We already have three people who would like to be trained, and there are 8 'dummies', so we have room for five more participants if anyone would like to be trained, or like an update. The Council is involved in the delivery of services, and represents the voice of the community. The work the council performs is wide and varied. It maintains the grassed areas within the parish, the play area equipment, the church yard and burial ground and it works closely with all the local community groups and organisations.

As a councillor representing your community you will help to shape the future of our village and keep it as the great place to live in that it is. Access to a computer is required as our meetings at present are via the internet.

The Council meets monthly, except in August, at the village hall. The meetings are in the evening on the first Monday of the month and last no more than two hours.

Parish council meetings are currently being held via Zoom conference meetings on the internet. The next meeting will be on Monday January 4th at 7.30pm. The delay for several months was due to some members not logging out as requested. This has now finally been achieved and the PC are in the process of setting up a new page which will link to the parish web site. Parishioners will then be able to register their views and opinions on parish affairs.

Village Hall

The Village Hall is open to a few groups meeting there who are observing social distancing. Traffic calming
