Chair's report

Welcomers Group

The welcomers group first met in November 2012 following a request from the pastoral council to move forward two of the four priorities set by the parish at the parish meeting earlier that year. The priorities set were:

- 1. To have a welcoming parish
- 2. That parishioners share their gifts and talents

The welcomers group is open to all in the parish, has a constructive and friendly meeting every two months and is currently regularly attended by Margaret Brumwell, Sheila Conway, Kelechi Dibie, Sheila Hamilton, Elizabeth Howell, Jean Potts, Beverley Prevatt Goldstein and Judy Whitfield.

In order to assist in making the parish a more welcoming place the welcomers introduced the custom of greeting parishioners before the weekend Masses and having twice monthly coffee mornings in the porch. Both have been appreciated by many in the parish. Both also depend on the goodwill and friendliness of many in the parish, not only in greeting, pouring coffee, making cakes, cleaning up but equally important in

sharing a friendly greeting, staying to chat during the coffee morning, making a small donation. These donations benefit our neighbours near and far with sums up to £100 going to:

- Medecins Sans Frontiers
- Newcastle Carers Group
- Nepal Earthquake Appeal
- Medical Aid for Palestinians
- Byker/ Heaton Fuel Poverty support

In order to assist with the sharing of talents and gifts we devised the parish information form, bit tedious to complete, but so useful in enabling us to serve our parish community. We have been able to utilise the computer skills in the parish to get this data base (nearly 300 now!) up and running but still some way to go.

A third priority of the parish was the religious life of the parish and we started the prayer basket so that we can share the gift of prayer and support each other.

We know that each of us is in our own way sharing our gifts and making our parish a more welcoming place. But we need more help to do this together:

- Can you join us in greeting (DBS check needed), or baking or serving at the coffee morning?
- Can you join us in the coffee morning in the porch, even for a little while?

- Have you completed your parish information form? Is there something you can offer? Is there something you need? Tell us again!
- Do put your prayer in the prayer basket. Its anonymous.
- What do you think we should be doing?

Tell one of the welcomers and join us at our meetings!

Spirituality

The spiritual life of the Church continues to grow through regular spiritual activities:

the celebration of the Eucharist at weekly and daily mass; the Good News and Exploring the Word of God groups. During Lent, we met weekly to follow the diocesan "Seven Faces of Mercy" programme. Each session was led by a different person, which gave us a range of perspectives. This led us to start monthly Salt of the Earth meetings which provide parishioners with opportunities to reflect on different aspects of their faith in a variety of ways. Some parishioners have attended a course on Catholic spirituality entitled 'Do You Love Me?' and some have attended days of renewal and retreat at Minsteracres. The Year of Mercy has invited us all to deepen our relationship with Jesus and to encourage others to renew their commitment. Although we have a range of meetings to nurture spirituality, if you would like any other activities, please contact me, Fr. Martin or Fr. Paddy so that we can grow and flourish as a faith community.

Forward Together in Hope

This Diocesan programme, initiated by Bishop Seamus has now been running since 2014. We have been given more information about the Diocese than ever before and been consulted (in depth) about the way forward for Parish life. Parishioners responded in great numbers in St Teresa's, to complete the main questionnaire and this was reflected in the "Observations" document we received back from the FTH team this summer.

This document was a commentary on our questionnaire responses — some of the comments include: "Your community is very involved with …the quality of life of others in the wider local community … with the quality of life of others in the wider world". Also, very importantly, considering our next steps: "Your community is very open to the possibility of developing closer relationships with neighbouring local communities"

The next stage we have been asked to consider is working in partnership with other Parishes. Parishioners have been asked to fill in short form and also attend a meeting to consider this. Fr Martin, Fr Patrick and I have attended a Deanery meeting to look at partnerships and all parishioners have been invited to attend a Vicariate meeting on the same topic.

A Partnership Proposal document then needs to be completed by the Parishes working together, given back to their parishes to review and sent to the FTH team by the end of November. These documents will form a plan to be considered by the Bishop and decisions made on partnerships next year.

All FTH information is regularly updated and displayed on the noticeboard at the back of church and in the newsletter. Please continue to think about and pray for a successful transition to new Parish arrangements across our Diocese.

Altar Servers

Currently we have 4 regular altar servers and 2 or 3 occasional servers. We have a rota system and servers are divided into two sets and serve every other week.

Recruitment for new altar servers is ongoing in St. Teresa's school.

We have four new severs beginning their training this month. Training, with parental consent, takes place in church on Friday afternoons. After several weeks the trainees are allowed to wear an alb and be in the sanctuary as an observer. There are 4 servers currently training. Any child

- Volunteers working together to refurbish Martha & Mary's café

 The Open Doors event in September which welcomed the local community to come in to all the churches down Heaton Rd.

Report on Youth Activities

FIRST HOLY COMMUNIONS

This year 24 children made their First Holy Communion in May. They were prepared for the sacrament by a team of catechists, under the leadership of their class teachers Catherine McKenzie and Tracy Allan-Baker. We would like to especially thank Fr Michael and Janet Purdy for their invaluable support and close working relationship with parents. Both have recently retired from their posts within the parish and will be greatly missed.

The First Holy Communion celebration this year was a memorable event, enabling the whole parish to come together and join in this special celebration. Once again, the children raised funds at coffee mornings held after First Holy Communion masses. His tear a total of £325 was raised which went towards supporting a village in Malawi. We congratulate the children and their families for this excellent effort.

CONFIRMATION PROGRAMME

Although this year confirmations were not held in St Teresa's, our recently confirmed young people were invited to a parish trip to The Source, a monthly gathering for Y9 to Y12 students in St Mary's Cathedral.

The idea of follow up events and spiritual, social and service to others after confirmation, is something which we hope can be explored further. Following Fr. Michael's final Sunday mass in the parish two of our young parishioners presented him with a framed keepsake of photographs of the two confirmation groups he led. Some of the ideas from the course he developed were used in the new diocesan confirmation guidelines released last year.

JOHN PAUL II AWARDS

The John Paul II award scheme is an initiative from Ireland recently introduced into our diocese enabling young people to take an active part in the life of their Church – in the life of their community and society. Two sixth form students from St Mary's School have been assigned to our parish and can be seen helping with the Fairtrade stall, church fairs and other activities. We wish them luck in completing their award.

FAIRTRADE

For several years, the Fairtrade stall has been run in the Church porch by young parishioners on the first weekend of each month after both masses. This year we raised £150 during Fairtrade fortnight through a coffee morning and quiz. The money was donated to Fairtrade charities to help producers in developing countries.

CAFOD GIFTS FOR LIFE

This is a youth inspired venture started by some of our young confirmation parishioners and their families two years ago. This was an original idea from the young people of our Parish. They raise funds through cake stalls and coffee mornings following key parish events and use the money to buy CAFOD gifts for life on behalf of the parish. Such initiative in young people is to be applauded and as a parish we thank them.

LOURDES YOUTH

This year once again young members of our parish travelled to Lourdes with the youth section of the Hexham and Newcastle Diocesan Pilgrimage

to help sick and disabled pilgrims. They included sixth form students from St Mary's school, university students and young workers including one of the young teachers from our school. If any young people in the parish, aged 16-25, feel they would like to join the Lourdes Youth section on next year's pilgrimage, please contact us for further details.

CITY YOUTH GROUP

The City Youth Group, a group of adults with a special interest in Youth Ministry, was formed following the mission to our secondary schools in 2013 and meetings have been regularly attended by Fr Michael and other parish members. The group produces regular newsletters reporting on current activities in our three catholic high schools. This is distributed in parishes throughout the city. Our parish was the first in the city to contribute parish news to the bulletin, reporting on our confirmation group and CAFOD Gifts for Life. The group is also supporting students attending the Flame congress in Wembley next year via fundraising at the November parish quiz. Anyone wishing to become involved in the group would be most welcome.

SUMMARY

We are very fortunate to have so many active young people associated with our parish, giving their time and talents to help others. We wish them every success in their futures and we pray for them as they continue on their faith journey.

As previously mentioned special First Holy Communion coffee mornings were held in the hall for children, families and parishioners after each First Holy Communion mass promoting links between our school and parish.

PARISH QUIZES

On the first Thursday of each month Val and Tony Ingoe run a charity quiz in St Teresa's Club. The quiz is a light hearted social event to which all parishioners are invited. During the past year monies raised have gone to support several good causes including HCPT, Medecins Sans Frontieres, Little Sisters of the Poor and RNLI.

CHURCH FAIRS

As usual our Christmas Fair was held on the last Saturday in November, and the Summer Fair on the first Saturday in July. Once again they were great social occasions bringing together parishioners, families from our school and the local community. The two events raised over £3000 to support our parish and school. This year's Christmas fair will take place on 26th November at 12 noon and everyone is most welcome.

SOCIAL EVENTS

The two most notable social events this year were the Golden Jubilees of Fr Michael and Fr Patrick. The social gatherings following the celebration masses for each priest were great successes and enjoyed by all who attended.

In addition to the events listed above, there are other groups within our parish offering opportunities for parishioners to meet socially: as mentioned in their own report, the Tuesday Ladies Group meets every week; Heaton Churches Together services are often followed by a social gathering for refreshments.

Report of the Finance Committee

The financial position of the Parish improved in the year to 31 March 2016.

Compared with the previous year, our total income for general purposes rose from £54,572 to £59,598, which was reflected in the surplus before repairs and renewals, which rose from £18,800 to £23,672.

After paying for repairs and renewals, we broke even for the year, with a small surplus of £322 compared with a deficit of £8,913 last year. Much of the £23,350 spent on repairs and renewals related to the Hall, including meeting the legal requirement for an accessible toilet. We did not (as we feared we might last year) have to draw on reserves to meet this, which remain about £64,000.

£6,243 of the reserves were earmarked for St Teresa's School: this account is credited with the value of the school's share of the summer fair each year and the cost in 2013 of extending the school's security fence to include the church, less the parish's contributions to the school, mainly for the upkeep of the Forest School.

Comparing this year with last, our income from renting out the Hall recovered from £7,450 to a record £9,851 – we had lost income during refurbishment the previous year. Our normal fund-raisers, the Summer and Christmas Fairs, raised £3,676, shared with the School, slightly up. Our running costs fell slightly from £30,332 to £29,780.

Our collections rose for a second year after four previous years of decline, from £30,888 to £32,732. Our special collections, for the wider Church outside the Parish, increased from £3,667 to £4,741. These figures understate parishioners' generosity because they do not include money raised within the Parish that goes directly to the charities concerned. The Committee this year included John Byrne, Frank Conway, Brian Dale (Treasurer), Anne Grant (Parish Secretary) and Paul Grant (Clerk of Works). Fr. Michael and the Committee would like to thank the many others involved in keeping the Parish solvent, including Conrad Cairns (Gift Aid returns), Jeff Handrihan (cashier), Tony Ingoe (sidesmen organiser) and Madeleine King(book-keeper).
