don't know about you but I really like living in New Farnley. I moved here with my family in 1976 when I was in my late teens and, despite the appalling winter, I loved it right away.

New Farnley is a great place to live, we look down on Leeds City Centre - just a few minutes away. Bradford, Wakefield, Huddersfield, and Halifax are all on our doorstep despite that our lovely village sits in the middle of an island of green. Parts of the original village still remain with small, newer developments slotted easily alongside, and somehow that works. What I really love though is the sense of community and belonging. Walk down any street, visit the Co-op, the fish and chip shop, or pop into the Woodcock for a drink and there's always a friendly smile and a 'hello'. People are friendly here – welcoming. I don't know how many times friends have come to visit and have said how much they'd love to live here. Those of us who do live here are lucky.

The thought of loosing that sense of community, that village identity, is worrying. It's not just we, the residents who see New Farnley as a great place to live; developers see it too and consider it the perfect place for new housing developments – developments that would destroy that sense of community which makes the area so special.

Last July I came home from work to discover that the field bordered by Low Moorside, Castle Ings and Whitehall Road, had been ploughed up and the Company who had done this planned to return to clear the trees and hedgerows - as a housing developer had bought the field on an Option, as a precursor to obtaining planning permission to build over 130 houses on the site.

Knowing an urgent response was needed to prevent this from happening, we leafleted local residents, quickly held a meeting, and formed The New Farnley Residents Association. followed a campaign of telephone calls and emails by local residents to the Leaders of Leeds City Council, MP Rachel Reeves, and local Councillors. Following a fast response by Rachel Reeves and Peter Gruen, the Deputy Leader of Leeds City Council, a Temporary Tree Preservation Order was placed on the field. Since then, we've worked hard to convince the Council that a housing development would be unsuitable on this site.

Working together, we, the residents, made a difference. Leeds City Council, in the new Site Allocations plan, has designated the field a Protected Area of Search (PAS Land) as they too believe the site to be unsuitable for building; the builder will no longer be going ahead with the development.

I think that by working together (and with the invaluable help of former Councillor John Hardy) we achieved a great deal and deserve to give ourselves a pat on the back.

We need to look to the future now and find a way to preserve the land, and the wildlife it supports, from any further attempts at development. I think that by working together, as a community, we can find a way to do that.

We asked Chris to replace some of the posts and hedges on Low Moor Side Lane into the park, as the previous ones had been removed and the gap was getting used as an access into the park.

We also continue to work closely with Jason Singh from Street Scene, who has removed a vast amount of litter around the village including Lawns Lane school footpath, Whitehall Road, Low Moor Side Lane and Back Lane.

The group has also been successful in securing some funding to put two benches down Back Lane. The location was suggested by some

We have also been approached by one of our local businesses who would like to work in partnership with the group which is fantastic,



and we hope to have a meeting shortly to discuss ideas.

Since the group was established in 2006 the group's aims have been- To promote the protection, conservation and enhancement of the heritage, history and local environment of New Farnley and its surroundings: To help improve the public facilities and resources of New Farnley; To increase public awareness regarding future developments in New Farnley; To support other community groups in New Farnley who are sympathetic to the aims of the NFVG; To represent the interests of all residents living in New Farnley and its surrounding areas; To work for improvements in the area, to increase community spirit, to provide social activities for all sections of the community and to promote a healthy environment; To encourage the participation of all residents in the area in a way that promotes equal opportunities and opposes racism, sexism and other forms of discrimination.

Over the years the NFVG Members have worked hard in numerous ways to achieve the

The NFVG Members along with local residents and businesses within New Farnley, achieved the adoption of the Planning Supplementary Document 'The New Farnley Village Design Statement'. This document is really important and any proposed planning applications should refer to this document.

Examples where the document has already been consulted have been; proposed planning on Castle Ings/Low Moor Side Lane, Wind Turbine Harper's Farm and Woodcock Farm (Back Lane)

We initiated the Flower In Bloom. which has improved the local environment as many residents said they would like more colour in the area.

New bins have been provided around the village and Back Lane. We have also requested bins for the school footpath on Lawns Lane the Bus Stop opposite Bolton's Garage and Nan Win Woods.

We initiated the landscaping to the rear of Farnley Hall Park; We have often mentioned the speed limit around the Village including Whitehall Road.

The group has regularly contacted and had meetings with local Services to address issues to do with dog fouling and issues that residents have raised over horse riders using footpaths and ginnels.

Contact has been made to have

street signs cleaned and repaired including Walsh Lane, West End and Castle Ings Drive

Regular contact with Street Scene to have rubbish removed, which has included dumping on the school footpath on Lawns Lane, dumping of asbestos adjacent to St Michael's, Back Lane, Low Moor Side Lane and other areas.

The group has made positive links with the PCSO's including the Wildlife Officer.

The group would like to say thank you once again to all those residents, businesses and local services that continually work in partnership with the Vision Group.

We would also like to thank those residents who have contacted various group members to raise concerns about their However, the group would like to encourage residents to use the contact numbers listed in this newsletter if they have specific concerns.

Our Tots Football programme is open to all children aged between 4 and 6 years old. Our aim is to develop the footballing skills required for children to begin to embark on their footballing journey. Each programme is tailored to each child's individual needs, however, our coaching philosophy and beliefs remain the same throughout. Once a player has graduated from our tots programme they will have the option to represent 'West Leeds IFC'.

Football is best when players are having fun and on the ball; we strongly believe children develop more efficiently when 'learning through play'. Children will remain engaged throughout all sessions ,either mentally or physically, meaning we avoid long lines of bored children!
