am writing to you as one of the Police Ward Officers for the New Farnley area. As part of my role, I undertake any work around long term issues and problems such as Anti-social behaviour and I also carryout work around crime patterns and crime prevention. I carry this out by directing local policing resources and working with various partners such as the Leeds City Council Housing Office and the Leeds Anti-Social Behaviour Team.

New Farnley has historically had low rates of Anti-Social Behaviour and reported crime. However we are always keen to hear about any local issues which arise and I would encourage local residents to report any incidents of concern via 999 in emergencies, 101 in non-emergencies and reports can also be made via the West Yorkshire Police website; this allows the best Police resource to be dispatched for ongoing incidents.

If there are any repeat issues that anyone would like to raise with myself then feel free to send me an email or write to me at Pudsey Police station and I will look to address any issue raised. I am also keen to attend any local Community groups where an input from the West Yorkshire Police would be of interest.

Police work is always ongoing in the New Farnley area of Leeds, including regular Police patrols, work with the Farmwatch group and Neighbourhood watches and other Community groups within the area. Cutting of Trees

Recently it came to our attention that established mature trees had been cut down opposite the Woodcock Inn. The New Farnley Vision Group immediately contactacted the Planning Department to discuss this issue. As a result of this enquiry, members of Leeds City Council, the Tree Office and the Planning Enforcement Team made a site visit to assess the site and how many trees had been destroyed.

Since the site visit and meeting we the NFVG, have been advised that a case has now been opened against the people who cut the trees down and the men concerned have received a letter confirming this. Unfortunately, the damage has been done; and all the mature trees have now gone, which has upset residents within the area.

Farnley Upper Moor Side **Conservation Area**

arnley Upper Moorside Conservation Area is going to be reviewed! Upper Moor Side's Conservation Area was first designated in 1975. The village has an abundance of special character, as well as architectural and historical interest. It is for these reasons, why Leeds City Council will be undertaking a review of the including Conservation area, producing a Conservation Area Appraisal and Management Plan.

A Conservation Area Appraisal records the special interest of an area including listed buildings, buildings of interest, key views and positive green spaces; all of which create a positive feature in the Conservation Area. The appraisal also lists the ways in which the special character of the area can be preserved and enhanced. The going document is currently through consultation within Leeds Council, but before the City

If you do spot someone who walks away without picking up and you know his or her name and address, please report them and they will be fined. There is a form on the Leeds City Council site entitled "Report litter or dog fouling" where you can fill their details and LCC will take action.

The volunteers involved in the New Farnley Flower In Bloom, met several times last year at the Lancasterian School Room to plan the Summer and Winter planting of all the tubs situated around New Farnley.

The summer display of geraniums and lobelia were fantastic, thank you to the residents who made such lovely comments. Unfortunately, the winter planting of the wallflowers have been very disappointing, but this has been due to the poor weather and not due to the lack of 'green fingers'.

The group have decided to go with a mixture of geraniums and begonias for the summer planting, so fingers crossed for vibrant displays.

Requests have been made for additional planters to be introduced around New Farnley. These will be at the top of Lawns Lane, adjacent to Bolton's Garage, next to the New Farnley Community Centre and Upper Moor Side. The additional planters have been possible because of a small grant we secured.

Due to concerns raised by some residents and group members about joy riders using the Green adjacent to the New Farnley Community Centre, causing a lot of damage, it has been suggested that further trees or large stones should be considered to be put around the Green, to prevent further damage. The group will need to contact the Parks Department to gain permission and ask their advice.

Future projects, again in consultation with the Parks Department, is to put a couple of large planters
