Ventnor & Bonchurch Parish website address www.ventnorcofe2.btck.co.uk Email: ventnorcofe@hotmail.co.uk In 1869 at Promontory Point, Utah, U.S.A, the two railroads, the Central Pacific and the Union Pacific were joined together with a 'Golden Spike', enabling travel from East to West coasts and unite the previously Disunited States of America. Of this event the Revd John Todd said, 'The East and West embrace; nay, we hardly know which East is and which is West. This one road has turned the world around.'

Ever since I heard of the transcontinental railroad, I have wanted to ride it and in March that dream was fulfilled as I travelled by train from New York City to San Francisco via Chicago. It was a wonderful trip, and a great way to connect with America, its scenery and people. I feel very fortunate to have done this, and to have been granted the Sabbatical leave in which to do so. I would like to place on record my indebtedness to all, in Ventnor/ Bonchurch and beyond, who enables this to happen.

Connecting was a big theme of this Sabbatical. In the USA I connected with relatives I hadn't seen for years; before that Sarah and I travelled to Wales and Oxford to connect with friends and relatives we hadn't see for a long time and may not see again; at Easter we connected with the roots of our Christian faith as we joined in Hilfield Friary, Dorset, with friars and visitors from all over the world. In addition, I spent a great deal of time writing a book which seeks to make connections between popular music and Christian faith. Certain pieces of music seem to connect people to each other and to God in quite a deep way. I'll be saying more about this at a talk on 'Soul Music' in ST Catherine's Church on Sat May 12<sup>th</sup> in the morning, which everyone is welcome to attend.

In May we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is the Great Connector. The disciples of Jesus had witnessed God's power in the resurrection of His Son Jesus, yet since his Ascension into heaven they had become rather disconnected, being told to wait until they receive 'power from on high'. The Spirit, when He came, connected them to God, to Jesus, to each other and to those to whom they were speaking. The Spirit made all the difference, turning the early Christians from a frightened group to those of whom it was said: 'They have turned the world upside down.' (Acts 17:6). The Holy Spirit can do the same for us today. He can turn our faith from formal to lively, from cold to warm, from distant to intimate. I pray that, this Pentecost, we will allow Him to connect us to God, to Jesus and to our neighbour and fill us with His greatest gift, that of love.

As we sang along the walk, 'It is a thing most wonderful, Almost too wonderful to be, That God's own Son should come from Heav'n. And die to save a child like me.'

## **VENTNOR WEATHER - March**

Rainfall of 100.6mm (3.96ins) was 192% of the average of 52.50mm (2.07ins). Rain fell on 24 days and the wettest day was the 30th with 13.4mm (0.53ins). This was the second wettest March on record (34 years). The wettest was 2001with 154.8mm (6.10ins). Snow fell on 6 days. The mean temperature of 6.3C (43F) was the 6th lowest on record, well below the average of 7.5C (45F). The warmest day was the 26th with 13.2C (56F) and the coldest night was the 1st with -3.9C (25F) this was the coldest night since 3rd February 2010

# HOLY TRINITY NEWS

As I write this, the sun is shining and it feels warm at last. Perhaps it is safe to say that spring has sprung, if I say it quietly!

There has certainly been something springing up at Trinity. The Church Hall has had a makeover, thanks to the hard work of Mark and Mary Bell. A new colour scheme and fresh paintwork has been beautifully complemented by new blinds, curtains and lights. What a difference it has made, as could be witnessed by the full house that attended our Spring Coffee morning at the beginning of April. The tables were all dressed in new tablecloths and the whole place was a delight. Many thanks to the PCC for agreeing to spend the funds and to those who put in the hard work. With a small congregation the workload always falls on the same people, who unfailingly give of their time and effort. We are fortunate indeed.

Next in line will be the church itself, as we clear away the Easter Garden and give the place its spring clean. It is always a pleasure to be in the company of such a good band of volunteers, each of whom has their own particular forté, and many hands do indeed make light work. It is amazing how much we get through and what a difference it makes.

Easter provided the opportunity to sing some of the special hymns which relate to that season, and one of them that I particularly liked is a very jolly Easter 'carol' written by G R Woodward. It is called 'This Joyful Eastertide' and is sung to a tune of the same name, adapted from a Dutch psalm melody and harmonized by Charles Wood. There are some nice versions on YouTube if you don't know it (listen to this one sung by Kings College choir: https://youtu.be/5tipsbcfuB4). George Ratcliffe Woodward was an Anglican priest who was a prolific writer of religious verse and arranger of tunes. He also published several books of carols, both for Easter and Christmas and frequently collaborated with Charles Wood. He wrote the words for 'Ding Dong Merrily on Hig' and' Past Three o'Clock', both of which were included in a 1924 publication of 'A *Cambridge Carol Book: Being 52 Songs for Christmas, Easter and other Seasons*'. So even if you have never heard of him, you will almost certainly

have sung a carol written by him.

It was good to welcome Hugh back to the fold the week after Easter and to see him looking so refreshed from his sabbatical. We must thank all the various clergy and readers who have covered in the interim, and also to the visiting organists, George, Ben Sampler and Douglas Potts, who have been helping out while Duncan is away. How lucky we are to have these talented musicians available to draw on.

By the time you read this we will have enjoyed a concert given by the children's choir from Fulham. They will have sung at Bonchurch the night before so they will have been working hard while they were here.

As ever, the Folk Club will be held on the third Friday of the month  $(18^{th} \text{ May})$  and all are welcome. No entry fee, but a raffle is held to finance the use of the Hall. A bar is available, as well as tea and coffee, and sausage rolls are served during the interval.

#### A WEEK OF ACCOMPANIED PRAYER FOR Isle of Wight CHURCHES GOING DEEPER WITH GOD A RETREAT IN DAILY LIFE, A SAFE SPACE TO EXPLORE

15 – 21 July 2018 Carisbrooke Priory

#### What the week is

The idea of a Week of Accompanied Prayer or Retreat in Daily Life arose in the 1970s for people unable to take a residential retreat. Such weeks have become tried and tested ways to help deepen prayer and reflect on what's important in life.

They provide confidential "safe spaces" where prayer pilgrims can reflect on their lives and relationship with God with the support of an experienced prayer guide. The focus is entirely on the pilgrim's faith journey, offering a rare opportunity to be listened to, to be affirmed in prayer, and to experience newer or different ways of praying. It can be another step in becoming more fully the person God has created us each to be.

One of the strengths of such a week is that it takes place in the context of everyday life; the whole of life as it is normally lived is the framework for the week of prayer

No special preparation is needed, just a longing to know God better, and a commitment to prioritise some time during the week to pray, to reflect and to meet with a prayer guide.

The prayer guide accompanies each pilgrim as they reflect on their daily life and prayer. Their "job" is to listen to and encourage the pilgrim, not direct or prescribe, though they may offer tools to help with the process of reflection.

#### How the week happens

It starts with everyone involved (prayer pilgrims and guides) meeting on the Sunday beforehand for an initial briefing and for prayer together. Although each person undertakes the retreat on their own there is usually a strong sense during the week of being part of a community of people engaged in the same task Then from Monday to Friday each pilgrim sets aside **30 minutes every day** to reflect, to pray, to be "alone with God"

In addition each pilgrim meets for **30 minutes each day** with their prayer guide at Carisbrooke Priory, Newport at a mutually convenient time.

It ends with everyone coming together again on the Saturday to draw the week to a close and give thanks for what has been experienced.

#### Previous prayer pilgrims said:

 $\Box$  I was apprehensive about joining the week but it turned out to be very helpful - I've never been listened to in this way before and felt so encouraged in my relationship with God.

 $\Box$  Life is so busy and I wasn't sure about committing so much time to the week. But it's the best thing I've done in a long time – listening to myself and to God and slowing down. I intend to make some changes.

 $\Box$  I think I expected something more holy! As it was I was able to be me and think and pray about life as I'm experiencing it now.

 $\Box$  Finding thirty minutes of quiet amidst the chaos of my daily life was extremely difficult – but I thank God that I did because the experience has been so valuable.

□ Brilliant week – not judged – not "churchy" – just felt I could be me.

 $\Box$  I think I always prayed "in my head" and have never thought feelings to be that important ...probably not a good idea to feel too much! After this week's experience I see that both the heart and head are important and something is changing.

□ It was a bit nerve-racking to begin with; I wasn't sure what to expect of the chat with the prayer guide...but I felt at ease during the week and able to share some of the difficult parts of my life.

 $\hfill\square$  It has brought me closer to God and (made me) more open to receive God's love in a way I could not imagine.

#### Is it for me?

This week is for anyone, at any stage of life. If you want to talk it over to find out more, then either talk to your vicar or the diocesan spirituality adviser Revd Dr Ruth Tuschling on 023 9289 9686.

If you wish to participate in the Week of Accompanied Prayer please contact Sally Rivlin with the details below.

The half hour appointments will run on Mon-Fri from 8.30am-12.30pm, 3pm-6pm and 7.30pm-8.30pm. Normally one has the same slot each day but some flexibility may be possible by arrangement with your guide.

Please wait for confirmation of your time.
