This month will give me the opportunity to spend some time again in Ghana. It is always a joy to share with the vibrant resourcefulness of the Ghanaian church; "doing a lot with a little" is one of their principles.

Ghanaian communities, especially in the north, live very much on the edge. Christians are not exempt from the pressures and poverty of daily life.

When they pray "give us this day our daily bread", the reality is that there is often nothing left in the cupboard from yesterday. Often there is no cupboard.

They have limited hope of educational and medical facilities, and they live without so much that we would take for granted.

Earlier in the year, Tamale Cathedral could not afford light bulbs.

But against this background, we shall enjoy the friendship of a cheerful, outgoing, generous bunch of Christians. "We're not poor, we just don't have any money"!

I shall be travelling with Debbie, my daughter-in-law, and we shall be in Ghana at the same time as a group from Ryde School who will be visiting Nako School in Wa, and working with Moses.

We shall be based in Tamale, and will have ample opportunity to update ourselves on the progress of Hope Academy. During the summer a toilet block has been built (yep – flush toilets).

The next development needs to be a dining pavilion. This sounds grand but is actually just a concrete floor, with a low wall around it, and a roof supported on pillars. The daily meal is an important part of the school's provision.

It will be interesting to see how the teaching is developing, especially with regard to children with special needs. Debbie is hoping to use her expertise and do some teaching in the school.

Graham Morris will be travelling with the Ryde School group, and on Sunday 29th October we should be worshiping together in Tamale Cathedral, each in our Canon's stall (what a privilege that is).

My plan will be to spend a couple of nights at least in Wenchi. The St Catherine's link there has gone quiet; the new minister there, Rev Samuel, is a lovely man but not a good communicator. I hope we can revive the situation, maybe with another correspondent at the Wenchi end.

We shall leave Heathrow on Saturday 21st October, and be back in time for the fireworks. Please pray for us - for safe travel, sound health, good contacts, blessing for us and our hosts. I will provide an itinerary for our visit, so that you can know what we're up to, and pray us around the country.

HOLY TRINITY NEWS

I recently took my Grand-daughter to church for the first time. Although she and the family had called into Holy Trinity back in the summer last year (during a choir practice) she had never been to a service before. Since I was staying with them in Keswick for the weekend, I decided to go to the local parish church (St John's) for the Eucharist service, and Grace announced that she would like to come too. I felt very privileged to be able to accompany her for her first experience of a church service, and she was as good as gold. She also asked whether we could go again, which was very gratifying and -- indicated that it had not been too much for her. The congregation were very friendly and welcoming, making sure we knew how to get to the children's area if we needed to, and supplying Grace with the juice and biscuit she had been looking forward to! Grace was due to start school the following day, and I discovered that the school (a CofE school nearby but with a different dedication) was going to be invited to take part later this month in the Harvest Festival service, so I hope she will get the chance to go again, even if I am not there to take her.

It made me realise again how important the friendliness of the congregation is, when welcoming visitors old and young alike. Gill Chaloner mentioned in a recent sermon how lucky we were at Holy Trinity that we had a relatively small congregation, and that consequently we usually all get along together quite well - fewer people to fall out with! For those visitors who come, or potential new parishioners, Holy Trinity always seems to manage to extend a very warm welcome and we always like to see our 'holiday' visitors who return on subsequent visits to Ventnor. The size of the congregation also allows Holy Trinity to feel very much like a church family and to offer support to each other when needed.

That is not to say, of course, that a larger congregation would not be a good thing. Apart from anything else it would help to share the burden of the necessary tasks required to keep a church building and community going. And the Church of England certainly knows how to keep its volunteers busy with bureaucracy and administration!

I always feel very fortunate to be part of the wider family of the three churches in the benefice (four if one includes the Old Church) and the opportunities it offers to take part in differing services and events, with a wide variety of people. This of course also extends to being able to provide choral support for all three congregations. Joint choirs often provide support at weddings, and the regular joint services allow the choir to benefit from having a full four parts (not usually possible at Holy Trinity unfortunately).

I know that it stretches our ministry team to provide the leadership required in a multi-parish benefice, and we should not forget the efforts that they have to go to. Gill noted at a recent Morning Worship service that it was the first full service she had been at for some weeks. It has become a regular occurrence that she quietly slips out of the choir at some point, to depart for another church to start the service for someone else. Not necessarily the most conducive way for her to obtain her own spiritual comfort. So we should give thanks to Hugh and the ministry team for juggling things around to provide the services the respective congregations need.

I think we are very lucky in Ventnor to have this variety, and to have a ministry team and congregations who are willing to share their experiences and services in such a friendly manner. Long may it continue.

The Secret Closet

Where do you think of going, when you pray, to be alone with God? Is it a place where you can sit quietly, to read, meditate on Scripture and look upon the glory of God's creation? Is it a bench in the park, on the Downs, the beach, a cliff, a peaceful church and its grounds, or a certain room in your house? There are many places one can go to, or be, to commune with the Lord, and they are all very viable and good places to go, but when Jesus, (in **Matt 6:6 But when you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you)** talks about this, He meant using a **Tallit**, which His listeners would have understood: **The Tallit (prayer shawl) as a 'closet'**

Outer garment was the Tallit (prayer shawl) it was heavier weight.

Psalms 61:4 Let me dwell in your tent forever! Let me take refuge under the shelter of your wings! Selah

Greek word for closet is (*tameion*), which means "an inner chamber, or a secret room." The closeting of oneself in the covering of the Tallit (prayer shawl) was a symbolic separation from the world around the Jewish man. (www.step-by-step.org/prayershawl-tallit.htm)

Jesus, as a Jew and a Rabbi, would have worn one of these daily, and knew how to use one. He would cover His head, and use the lapels, known as "wings" as a set of "doors" and shut Himself off from the world, in His quiet places, to pray. It was also known as a tent, or Tabernacle, mirroring the one the Hebrews had in the Desert, as described in Exodus, and allowed for one's personal "Holy of Holies".

Interestingly, the Alb that the Bishop, or your Vicar, wears also reflects a Tallit, and is treated in almost the same reverential way in its significance.

The Holy Spirit (Ruach Ha'Kodesh or "Breath of God") is described in Scripture as a covering that marks out the power, and close walk with God, a Christian has and, although not seen, is evidenced by the fruits of that same Spirit, all of which the Tallit foreshadows. So, when you pray, do you allow for that covering?

As a sidebar, it is interesting to note, for example, that John Wesley's mother would cover her head with her apron to pray, despite the number of children (19, of which John was one!) she had!

That was her 'secret closet'! This returns me to my original question; where is your 'secret closet'?
