"SOUL MUSIC"

From the 16th Century Lutheran Pastor Martin Rinkart to Bob Dylan, via the Wesleys, negro spirituals, The Beatles, Bruce Springsteen, and various other points in between, Hugh led us through the development of hymnody into popular music, using the magic of PowerPoint and U-Tube!

Hymns originally appeared to be much more corporate songs of praise and thanks to God, exemplified by "us" and "we" in the sentiments expressed, but gradually became more personal, ("I once was lost, but now am found") and then less religious but more passionate, until some songs, such as the later ones of John Lennon, came across as having very little sense of hope. Perhaps it was both Bruce Springsteen and Bob Dylan who were able to express themselves on a way not conventionally religious, but movingly spiritual. They had a way of saying "Let's make the world a better place" that seemed very close to our saying "Thy Kingdom Come."

The morning was attended by a variety of people, including the Area Dean and Archdeacon Peter, and there were some probing questions and interesting discussions at the end of each of the three sessions.

Thank you, Hugh, for putting together an interesting series of talks...... We await the book!

DAILY BIBLE READINGS





The Church of England brings cashless transactions to its congregations

The Church of England has recently made contactless, virtual terminal, and SMS mobile payments available throughout England, in a bid to make transactions faster and easier for the Church's congregations. In an increasingly cashless era, churches will now be able to offer cashless payment options for events including weddings, christenings, church fetes and concerts, as well as for making one-off donations and the booking of churches and halls.

Over 16,000 churches, cathedrals, and religious sites will now have access to portable card readers through the Church of England's Parish Buying portal through a partnership with SumUp and iZettle. The readers will be used to take contactless payments, Apple Pay and Google Pay, as well as chip & PIN capable. The pay-as-you-go pricing is well suited to the needs of religious institutions, charging only a small transaction fee when the reader is used. The decision follows a trial which began in summer 2017 in cathedrals and parish churches.

Using iZettle, church-goers now have the choice to pay and make contributions in whatever way suits them best - whether it is by cash, card, mobile or wearable technology - which will benefit both the church and its visitors.



BONCHURCH EVENTS

A WEEK OF ACCOMPANIED PRAYER FOR Isle of Wight CHURCHES GOING DEEPER WITH GOD A RETREAT IN DAILY LIFE, A SAFE SPACE TO EXPLORE

15 – 21 July 2018 Carisbrooke Priory

What the week is

The idea of a Week of Accompanied Prayer or Retreat in Daily Life arose in the 1970s for people unable to take a residential retreat. Such weeks have become tried and tested ways to help deepen prayer and reflect on what's important in life.

They provide confidential "safe spaces" where prayer pilgrims can reflect on their lives and relationship with God with the support of an experienced prayer guide. The focus is entirely on the pilgrim's faith journey, offering a rare opportunity to be listened to, to be affirmed in prayer, and to experience newer or different ways of praying. It can be another step in becoming more fully the person God has created us each to be.

One of the strengths of such a week is that it takes place in the context of everyday life; the whole of life as it is normally lived is the framework for the week of prayer

No special preparation is needed, just a longing to know God better, and a commitment to prioritise some time during the week to pray, to reflect and to meet with a prayer guide.

The prayer guide accompanies each pilgrim as they reflect on their daily life and prayer. Their "job" is to listen to and encourage the pilgrim, not direct or prescribe, though they may offer tools to help with the process of reflection.

How the week happens

It starts with everyone involved (prayer pilgrims and guides) meeting on the Sunday beforehand for an initial briefing and for prayer together. Although each person undertakes the retreat on their own there is usually a strong sense during the week of being part of a community of people engaged in the same task Then from Monday to Friday each pilgrim sets aside **30 minutes every day** to reflect, to pray, to be "alone with God"

In addition each pilgrim meets for **30 minutes each day** with their prayer guide at Carisbrooke Priory, Newport at a mutually convenient time.

It ends with everyone coming together again on the Saturday to draw the week to a close and give thanks for what has been experienced.

Previous prayer pilgrims said:

 \Box I was apprehensive about joining the week but it turned out to be very helpful - I've never been listened to in this way before and felt so encouraged in my relationship with God.

 \Box Life is so busy and I wasn't sure about committing so much time to the week. But it's the best thing I've done in a long time – listening to myself and to God and slowing down. I intend to make some changes.

 \Box I think I expected something more holy! As it was I was able to be me and think and pray about life as I'm experiencing it now.

 \Box Finding thirty minutes of quiet amidst the chaos of my daily life was extremely difficult – but I thank God that I did because the experience has been so valuable.

□ Brilliant week – not judged – not "churchy" – just felt I could be me.

 \Box I think I always prayed "in my head" and have never thought feelings to be that important ...probably not a good idea to feel too much! After this week's experience I see that both the heart and head are important and something is changing.

□ It was a bit nerve-racking to begin with; I wasn't sure what to expect of the chat with the prayer guide...but I felt at ease during the week and able to share some of the difficult parts of my life.

 $\hfill\square$ It has brought me closer to God and (made me) more open to receive God's love in a way I could not imagine.

Is it for me?

The half hour appointments will run on Mon-Fri from 8.30am-12.30pm, 3pm-6pm and 7.30pm-8.30pm. Normally one has the same slot each day but some flexibility may be possible by arrangement with your guide.

It takes a year to produce a loaf of bread, from field to fork. Yet in the UK we throw away 24 million slices of it, every day. The average person will throw away more than half a loaf of bread every month.

A recent survey by Love Food Hate Waste has also found that among 18 to 34-year-olds, 69 per cent throw bread away every week. The campaign is urging people to slice and freeze their bread when they get it home, so that it can last for several months.

The English monk St. Boniface (ca. 672-754) is known as the Apostle of Germany because he organized the Church there in the 8th century.

Named Winfrith by his well-to-do English parents, Boniface was born probably near Exeter, Devon. As a boy, he studied in Benedictine monastery schools and became a monk himself in the process. For 30 years he lived in relative peace, studying, teaching, and praying. In his early 40s he left the seclusion of the monastery to do missionary work on the Continent. Because his first efforts in Frisia (now the Netherlands) were unsuccessful, Winfrith went to Rome in search of direction. Pope Gregory II renamed him Boniface, "doer of good," and delegated him to spread the gospel message in Germany.
