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A Pastoral Letter from our Locum Minister

'There is a tide in the affairs of men which taken at the flood leads to fortune; omitted, all the voyages of their life is bound in shallows and miseries.'

Shakespeare's shrewd observation on the world of politics may be baptised and applied to the life we share in the church.

In the providence of God, the long years our congregation has been without a full-time minister have ended. The Rev. Michael Fucella has accepted the call from Biggar linked with Black Mount to serve as minister among us (the vote was 167 for and 2 against) and will be inducted to the linked charge on Thursday, 22nd August at 7.00 p.m. The service will mark a new beginning in the life of both congregations and in the weeks and months that follow, a window of opportunity will open up before us.

The open window will present us all with different opportunities. For many of us it will be the chance to touch base with the church after a long absence and become involved, if only in small ways to start with - and who knows what good may stem from such a step. For others of us it will be the encouragement to renew a commitment to Christ already made and sharpen the focus of our discipleship.

I have never forgotten the question a fellow minister once asked me, "David, do you still have zest for ministry?" The fact is we can all lose our zest. The charge of dynamite which detonated our conversion may have become a damp squib, the strongly burning fire a heap of dying embers, the candle flame a smoking wick, and the strong pulse an irregular beat.. Our eyes may lose their sparkle and our step its spring. True convictions, once firm, may become muted or corroded by the acids of scepticism. Cynicism may quell bubbling enthusiasm. How many in the church have lost their zest!

That this should happen over time is understandable. The Christian life is more a marathon than a sprint. Christian service is undeniably demanding in terms of time and energy. Witness, too, requires perseverance as the results are often not immediate. And adverse circumstances do take their toll of our spirits. So it is all too easy to lose our zest, to become discouraged, to slacken off, and even give up. That is why Scripture is full of exhortations to perseverance in the face of discouragement. Here are some:

Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervour, serving the Lord. (Romans 12.11)

Never lose your sense of urgency. (2 Timothy 4.2)

Let us not become weary in doing good. (Galatians 6.9)

Come then, stiffen your drooping arms and shaking knees, and keep your steps from wavering. (Hebrews12.12)

In the commencement of a new ministry, God presents all of us with a window of opportunity. May I urge you to grasp with both hands the opportunities the window offers you while it remains open.

It is over three and a half years since I became interim moderator and locum. It has been a privilege to minister to you both in church on a Sunday and in your homes, particularly at times of loss and difficulty. And my heartfelt thanks to those of you who have supported me with their prayers and encouraged me when otherwise I might have lost my zest.

Wishing you all God's blessing at this time of new beginnings, Yours warmly,



After a long vacancy, which has given us time to ponder and reflect, I detect a new enthusiasm, born of expectation and anticipation. There is work to be done. Let us use the resources, skills and talents which we have been given, to make out Mission a reality. Anon

Manse News

During the long time that we haven't had a minister in place, the Manse (6c Leafield Road) has been let out as a commercial tenancy. It would be nice to name all the volunteers who have given of their time and talent - some for a few hours, others for several days - and to thank them publicly, but as I might inadvertently miss someone out and cause unintended offence, I won't. You know who you are, and many heartfelt thanks to you all. Having said that I must mention Pete Brotherstone who ably directed the professional workers who have been on site, and Don Barrie



who managed the garden and other exterior activities, and has led from the



front putting in many hours of hard graft.

The house wasn't quite 100% ready for the Fucellas when they arrived in Biggar, but I do know that they appreciated all the hard work which had been done on their behalf. They have now happily settled into their newly refurbished home and are more than happy to allow us to finish off any additional work around them.

This provided us all with a greater understanding of what would was being presented the next day, and if we wanted to, ask a question or add a new section or amendment and we were able to help each other out with the phrasing and wording.

My particular highlights from the week were: Heart and Soul in Princes' Street Gardens which was fantastic, in particular the worship at the end of the afternoon. The Guild report along with the Scottish Bible Society and the Mission and Discipleship reports were really inspiring and it was just so great to hear about their work not only in Scotland but the wider world as well. On the Thursday afternoon after close of debates the youth delegates had a small reception with the Right Reverend Lorna Hood and afterwards we went to Holyrood Palace for the beating of the retreat and the Lord High

A View from the Pew

Sometime past occasionally there was a feature introduced into the Sunday worship service when invited persons were asked to speak on "This Time Tomorrow...the "3 T's".



I would like to suggest that a more measured

approach might be to reflect on life, our hopes, our aspirations, our spiritual thoughts under the heading "Take Time To Think"...the "4...T's". I believe that reflecting on what we have done helps US to clarify in our hearts and minds what we have done well, that which we have done poorly, and what we could have done better/differently in the future so that the result might be enhanced spiritual growth and move forwards. When all is said and done our bodies are designed to move in a forward direction. There is "No growth without some pain" that is if we are prepared to face the challenge of moving from our existing comfort zone.

THINKING is not a passive exercise for self-indulgent navel gazing but rather a pro-active exercise designed to stimulate us. When unexpected situations occur that we are not prepared for we tend to panic and take a knee jerk response. Not so a Highland stag. When the leader of the herd becomes aware of impending danger, he first raises that magnificent head to sense from which direction the threat is coming from and then leads the herd in the opposite direction...but it is that "Taking Time To Think" that leads to safety.

We all need to allocate some private quiet time, undisturbed time just to think and reflect. Why have secular organisations started to make money charging people to sign up to attend retreats, or philosophies in meditation? Perhaps if more of us allocated a time each day to quietly meditate on a structured passage of scriptural themes, followed by a time of prayer for ourselves and others it would lead our minds into a range of thoughts that could be classified as constructive, pro-active, a way ahead, the avoidance of impending problems by formulating a cohesive plan of positive action.

If anyone caught me in my office with my eyes closed and had the temerity to accuse me of sleeping on the job, my response was that I was simply "Taking Time To Think" of strategic matters by blotting out any possible distractions from surrounding influences, I suppose that is why we are taught to close ...

Did you know that every Brazil nut you've ever eaten was gathered from wild trees in the Amazon rainforest? They cannot be cultivated: they do not survive without the complex forest ecosystem and are dependent on particular types of bees, orchids and rodents that live there.

Every March, Bebé Albenize and her community work incredibly hard gathering Brazil nuts from the rainforest. These nuts play a central role in the

life of thecommunity, who live in poverty. They provide vital nutrients in a place where up to 10 per cent of children are malnourished, and they are virtually the only source of income for buying essentials like medicine. Without the nuts, life would be almost impossible for the community: and yet the rainforest is under threat from



mining and logging companies. That's why Christian Aid partner the Pro-Indigenous Commission of São Paulo (CPI) is helping the community gain the legal rights to its land.

As we celebrate God's good gifts this harvest, let us remember CPI's work, Bebé's community and their struggle to protect this complex and fragile creation. This harvest, we are helping them bear fruit for the future. Thank you so much for all you can give.



Harvest

Harvest Festivals used to be celebrated at the beginning of the Harvest season on 1 August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers made loaves of bread (the food of life) from the new wheat crop and gave them to their local church. Rhey were then used as the Communion **bread** during a special mass thanking God for the harvest. The custom ended when Henry VIII broke away from the Catholic Church. and nowadays we have harvest festivals at the end of the season.

The tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches as we know it today began in 1843, when the Reverend Robert Hawker invited parishioners to a special thanksgiving service for the harvest at his church at Morwenstow in Cornwall. Victorian hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helped make his idea of harvest fesannual custom of decorating churches with home-grown tival service.



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
