#### **Pastoral Letter**

I recently came across a survey into the reasons why church attendance in the UK is in decline. 14,000 people responded to the following questions:

- If you attend church regularly, what are the main things which encourage you to attend?
- If your attendance is merely out of a sense of duty, what could be changed to make the services more appealing?
- If you used to be a church-goer, but now attend infrequently, what were the main reasons which led to this? What could be changed in order for you to attend again regularly?
- If you have never been a church-goer, what could be done to encourage you to begin?
- The traditional custom of 'clergy visiting' has steadily declined in spite of the maxim 'a house-going minister makes a church-going people'. Do you think the demise of pastoral visitation is significant?

Some common criticisms and pleas were:

- too little thought given to the conduct and content of church services which are often uninspiring and do not connect with people's everyday lives
- the need to blend the traditional and contemporary in worship
- the weakening of the pastoral tie between clergy and people
- the failure to present robust reasons for believing, the impression often being given that there are no answers to difficult questions and that it is just 'a matter of faith'
- the lack of clear teaching about what Christians believe.

The techniques of consumer research and the yardstick of client satisfaction may not apply to the church as they do to other organisations. The church is not a business and the Spirit, as Jesus reminds us, is like the wind – he blows where he likes and often confounds our expectations. But that is not to say that the church cannot learn much from what people say. At a time when the membership of the Church of Scotland in 2011 dropped by a further 13,857 (the last year for which figures are available) any reasons for the unabated decline cannot be ignored.

I would be interested in your responses to the questions asked in the survey. Drop them in (anonymously if you prefer) to the church office in the Gillespie Centre.


Thank you to everyone who gave so generously to the retiring offerings at our 'Christingle', Christmas Eve and Christmas Day services.

# A View from the Chancel

Regular readers will have seen the article in the last News and Views, regarding our church's financial position. To paraphrase a well-known politician, "as members of Biggar Kirk, we are all in this together". Money is always a sensitive topic, but one



that will not easily go away, even if we would prefer to ignore it.

In the last issue, I suggested that you, as members of Biggar Church, are not given enough information about our financial position, and I promised to try to improve the information flow. I'm afraid that this is a slow process, but we *are* putting the building blocks in place. In November, Session approved a budget for 2013. The budget headings are now more meaningful than they were in the past, giving us a *firm foundation* for reporting progress back to you. This will begin to happen, both through News and Views, and through the intimations in the Order of Service.

#### The Problem

Our Treasurer is now compiling the financial figures for 2012, which will show a significant shortfall of income over expenditure.

Much of our expenditure is fixed, so if we wish the church to continue operating as it always has done, we don't have a great deal of room for manoeuvre. We should be able to afford this, but we need to take action now. Congregational giving in 2012 was about £66,500. For 2013, to meet our budget, we need to increase this to £84,500. Yes, that's about 27%, just to avoid further loss.

It is encouraging to know that you, our members, are reading, and reacting to this information. It has been interesting to observe three different reactions:

- 1. Some members are understanding the issue, accepting the shared responsibility, and quietly increasing their regular giving.
- 2. Other members have said "I'm paying my share, and I'm not giving any more".
- 3. Yet others simply respond by saying "I'm not subsidising those who don't pay".

I wonder what Jesus would have said?

#### The Opportunity

Let's remind ourselves again - as members of the Church of Scotland, each of us has promised "to give a fitting proportion of my time, talents and money for the Church's work in the world." We can't all afford to give much money but we have time and talents which can be used to good effect. Others find it difficult to give much time but are able to give more financially.

Either way, here is an opportunity. I learned many years ago that the more you give (time, talent, love, whatever) the more you receive in return, and often in unexpected ways.

In a recent sermon, David Easton, our interim minister, spoke of the power of prayer. He reminded us that praying is not easy, and that sometimes "doing" is easier than praying. Most importantly, he stressed that praying is an essential part of planning, before taking action.

So here's another personal message – why not take a little time to think about your giving, pray about it, then take action according to what your heart is telling you.







Have we moved so far from Christian teaching that we are beyond help?



In 2013, we are looking forward to our summer outing when we will be travelling to Perth after having a 'stop off' at a local garden centre in Tayside.


