Two way partnership

Partnership in mission is a catch phrase that has been heard in the Church of Scotland for years. The picture it conjures up for many people is of a select few going overseas as missionaries. We do not often think of the role of the people left behind in the pews. When Mike and I were sent by the Church of Scotland to work in Thailand in 1990, we felt that a large part of our role was keeping in touch with our 35 partner churches here in Scotland. They encouraged us, prayed for us, wrote letters to us, sent us gifts, supported us and many projects financially and visited us. We wrote letters, informed the churches about what we were up to and I hope were able to both enthuse and challenge people to think more about both cross cultural mission and their own journey of faith. Mission for us really was a matter of partnership and we could not have stayed in Thailand without that partnership. We saw ourselves as the hands and feet of the churches in Scotland, carrying out their work in Thailand. And that work was not one way. As we engaged with the Church in Thailand, churches in Scotland were blessed as well as being a blessing, and learnt new and exciting things.

When we left Thailand to come to Scotland a very special thing happened. Partnership was expressed in a new way. Mike was a member at Rajdhevi Church. This is a small church that was started in 2010 close to where we lived. By the time we left in 2012 there was a regular congregation of about 50 members. They were sad that we were going, but immediately saw it as an opportunity to be in partnership in mission. Our last Sunday there was very moving as the elders laid hands on us and prayed. They commissioned us to be their mission partners, their representatives in Scotland. Their hands and feet in God's work here in Scotland. They have continued to pray for us, write to us and have sent us money to support Scottish children to go to SU camps (child sponsorship in reverse!!). It is humbling to be in a partnership like this. And it is not just us they support. They are praying for the congregations of Biggar and Black Mount. I am sure one day they will visit to see what God is doing here!

Farewell to Ann

I first met Ann for a coffee in the Gillespie Centre shortly after she arrived in Biggar. We talked about the various ministries that were currently taking place for children and teenagers and she listened carefully to all I had to say. I had no idea at that point that she was going to prove such a huge support in all of the areas we talked about – or indeed introduce



new initiatives taking us forward in all we are trying to achieve.

She immediately offered her help with that summer's Holiday Club and has been part of that team ever since. One of the things Ann and I have talked about during the time she has been with us is how wonderful it is to come across people who volunteer for things and say "Yes!" whenever they can. I can't think of a time when Ann has not come alongside us in our efforts and frequently offered to do more than was being asked – a real blessing to all of us.

She has been involved in so many areas of our children's ministry – frequently encouraging and supporting new developments and ideas. Last year she enabled us to organise a visit from Bibleworld and her previous experience and calm preparations were invaluable as we undertook this new venture. It was a great success with almost 400 children and 132 adults attending over the week. I know she has also been involved in planning Messy Church and the recent one day clubs held on school in-service days – again innovations which help us engage with families and children in our community.

For years members of our church have prayed that a Scripture Union club might take place in our local schools, and Ann has proved to be an answer to prayer in helping to provide this. We know there are many children who are interested in finding out more about Jesus – but who do not come to church. It is vital that we find opportunities to meet them where they are and explore different ways to engage their interest. Ann has not only built up a relation-

ship with our local schools but has faithfully been part of the small team who work with the children at SU every week. Her presence there will be sorely missed.

In the last few months Ann has been trying to foster another new development – a partnership between different churches to provide for the needs of the young people in our midst. It's too early to say what the response to this venture will be from the teenagers themselves although an important step has been taken in identifying this need and engaging willing volunteers to help as well as creating an exciting programme for the young folk. Her perceptiveness and desire to find solutions has helped us to see how we might work together in new and creative ways.

I know Ann has done so much more than work with our children and young people – but most of the times I have worked with her that is what she has been doing and I will leave it to others to talk about the many other ways she has served in our area. I know everyone will want to join with me in expressing our deep appreciation of all she has done. Thank you so much Ann – and all the best in whatever you take on next!

In the summer of 2011, the Ministries Council assigned Ann Lyall to serve in our corner of Lanark Presbytery. At the time there were six parishes without a minister, including ourselves at Biggar, with a seventh shortly to become vacant, and the task of providing cover was becoming increasingly difficult. Her appointment was welcomed, not just as a stop-gap



measure, but because her outstanding record as a member of the Diaconate of the Church of Scotland, her proven gifts and spirituality wedded to practical sense, promised much. We have not been disappointed. In the two and a half years she has been with us, she has worked tirelessly at Biggar and in the parishes of Black Mount, Libberton and Quothquan, Culter (before the dissolution of the congregation in January of this year), Symington, Cairngryffe, Glencaple and Lowther. At Biggar Kirk, the monthly service on a Sunday afternoon in St. Mary's Hall which she has developed along with the Pastoral Committee for those who find access to the church on a Sunday morning difficult, has been particularly appreciated. Then there have been the relationships which have grown out of the pastoral care she has shown to many. We thank God for her and acknowledge our debt to her.

Ann's appointment, which originally was for two years, was extended, but the time has now come for her to move on, Her next placement is at Muirhouse St. Andrews and the Old Kirk in Pilton, Edinburgh. In expressing our warm thanks for her ministry among us, we wish her God's blessing in her new appointment and promise her our prayers.



Apart from getting to know us individually, Mike has to become familiar with two churches, whose expectations of him are both different and demanding, and, at the same time, to use the opportunity to bring fresh and challenging ideas into our church life and worship.

Add to this an inherited list of weddings, funerals (which can never be scheduled) questions over the future use of our church buildings, and Presbytery activity, and you can quickly see that it needs a special person to take it all on board. We are already seeing that Mike is indeed a special person, and that, with Jane, we have not just a new minister, but a very capable and committed *team*. Our job, now, is to support them, pray for them, and respond positively when they ask for our time and talents.

I predicted that this will be a time of new beginnings and opportunities for all of us, and that Biggar Kirk will rise to the challenge.

One of the challenges is how we use technology in worship. We have a modern, good-quality sound system, but it doesn't always work in the way we would like. Much of the technology which we use every day has "intelligence" built into it. (My car has automatic lights, automatic windscreen wipers, automatic gearbox, automatic climate control and lots of other gadgets). But a sound system, no matter how good, needs to be "driven" by someone who has sympathy with how to use it properly. Fortunately, it is not particularly complicated, and a little training is all that is needed.

Ideally, we need a rota – a small team of people prepared to check the settings on a Sunday morning, and make adjustments discreetly during the service. If you would like to VOLUNTEER to help, please contact the Session

A View from the Pew "Until He Comes"

I love making up simple ways to recall learning disciplines. In the past I have referred to the "3 T s", then the "4 T s" and this time I wish to recommend the "6 C's":- Communion; Community; Commemoration; Cove-

nant; Celebration; Commitment.

Most Christians regardless of their denominational title will hopefully agree that whenever we approach the Lord's Table we should remember that it is a corporate act. Hence the call to all those who love the Lord to share in that celebration feast is central to our focus on Christ's redemptive powers as a result of His sacrifice at Calvary. We come together to show our loyalty to Him by a renewal of that pledge to follow and serve.

The celebration of the Lord's Supper is wonderful within itself, but it is only a temporary provision. In the call to take part in this celebration some leaders make the statement "Once more- once less until He comes" which underlines the temporary provision celebrated within Christian congregations, we undertake this memorial feast only "Until He comes".

What a privilege...what an honour offered to ALL those who love the Lord as their personal Saviour to be able to take part and to renew this confession of faith. Therefore before taking part in this feast we should draw close to God and in the name of His only Son the Lord Jesus Christ make our private confession of overt and covert sin to ensure that we do not heap condemnation upon our heads.

It is a serious occasion, more important than a family occasion, more important than meeting Royalty and so if for those occasions we present ourselves looking our best how much more important is it to present ourselves in the best and most meticulous manner available to us...after all, this is the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

This sacrament is a token of our belief in our Master's return, without such a belief it cannot truly be partaken of, so permit me to repeat it is only "Until HE comes"

Christmas in Northeast Thailand by Mike Fucella

Our first assignment in Thailand was in the Northeast of the country far away from the capital city on the border to Laos. People here have their own distinctive dialect, cuisine and culture. Christian people in *Issan* are a tiny minority amongst a majority folk Buddhist population.

Christmas was seen as the one annual festival that the Christians hosted and everyone, whether they were Christian or Buddhist, joined in the prepara-



tions as well as the celebrations. Christians also helped out at the Buddhist festivals that happened much more frequently than once a year.

For folk in the Northeast Christmas wasn't always on the 25th of December as children would have to go to school if the 25th happened to be a weekday. So the church usually opted for one or other of the Saturdays or Sundays in December being sure to coordinate with the other Christian churches in the district so as not to have it on the same day. We did this so that we could travel to each other's churches and celebrate together! Every weekend in December ended up being Christmas day as folks from each church loaded into the backs of pickup trucks to head off to a neighbouring church for fun and festivities!

Christmas day (whichever day that might be) began at 3am as the men went round the back of church to slaughter the cow bought especially for the occasion and which would become the staple food. Dispatching of the animal was usually swift and humane. After the deed was done the early dawn would be filled with the sound of meat cleavers on big blocks of wood as the women went to work mincing the beef to make spicy *laab*- a dish that is eaten at every festival and for which the Northeast is famous.

Food would be served as people started to arrive and everyone would then come to the first church service of the day. After the service the loud speakers would be switched on for constant, deafening music interspersed by a DJ who had funny jokes to tell or announcements to make. More food would be consumed and the children's games would begin. Barefoot,


