## From our local councillor

February is the month in which Wiltshire Council sets its budget for the Financial Year. The budget setting process involves many meetings both to work up the budget but also to present the budget to the public whose money we are spending. That is the difficulty that Councillors have as we try to produce a balanced budget by mid February and take what is becoming a year on year 10% cut in our central government funding with no prospect of any improvement in future years - whoever wins the General Election. All this takes place before the Council vote on the

budget. This year the stringent central government cuts to our funding mean that we are having to find significant savings from across the whole range of Council services. We try to do this without reducing front line services to our residents but inevitably the deeper the central government cuts bite the more effects will be seen on local operations.

Somehow we manage to keep the County going without too much disruption and our roads do get repaired, our libraries remain open, our leisure centres continue to run, our campus building programme continues and most importantly our most vulnerable residents continue to receive the help that they need. These are difficult times but rest assured that your Council will continue to do its best for our County.

There remains good news in the midst of the dreary financial shenanigans and much of it is within my own Cabinet portfolio area. I am afraid that it is inevitable that at budget time Cabinet members become a little tribal as they fight to maintain their own service budgets and service delivery. In my own areas I am pleased that we have maintained our flood alleviation funding in excess of £1million, that we are retaining and enhancing our leisure centres, that our Campus programme continues, our Area Board grant funding continues and we have managed to protect our valued library service. All this has been achieved whilst at the same time we are maintaining all of the services to the vulnerable in our county.

So I think that the message is that budgets are not all bad news if they are managed carefully!

## Are you a parent or carer (including grandparents) of a child aged 8 – 12?

You may have already seen or heard about the new National Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children online safety campaign, **Share Aware**. Many parents feel out of their depth in understanding what their children are doing online and what the risks might be. This campaign is aimed at parents and carers of children aged 8-12, and is a good tool to help with understanding what children like to get up to online, which should help parents to have those difficult conversations with children about staying safe.

There is a downloadable Share Aware guide for parents that has three main purposes:

- ✓ To provide an overview of sites, apps and games that children and young people use from a user-perspective
- ✓ To give parents the confidence to facilitate balanced and informed conversations about what their children are doing online
- ✓ To encourage parents to look at social networking platforms themselves and form their own views about the appropriateness of popular sites for their children.

#### Report of the Parish Council Meetings

Jonathon Seed regularly attends to advise on local matters and report on wider issues. Recently he has spoken about the travellers sites and particularly the new one on the Devizes side of the Semington roundabout. It is expected to get planning permission subject to making the entrance smaller although Jonathon's view is that this will be over-development.

Last year's hedge growth was quite lush and there have been several lengths which have overgrown the verge or obscured traffic sight lines. The council has asked field owners and residents to cut back the hedges and have the option to employ contractors if problems persist.

Willow Services will continue with the grass cutting of the verges at the top end of the village. Matt Long has offered to maintain the area around the village pump.

The bellringers at Steeple Ashton are marking the one hundredth anniversary of the death of local servicemen in the Great War with 100 peals plus their age at the time of death.

The precept was set again at £3000.

Saturday 14 March "**The Imitation Game**" During the winter of 1952, British authorities entered the home of mathematician cryptanalyst and war hero Alan Turing (**Benedict Cumberbatch**) to investigate a reported burglary. They instead ended up arresting Turing himself on charges of "gross indecency", an accusation that would lead to his devastating conviction for the criminal offence of homosexuality - little did officials know, they were actually incriminating the pioneer of modern-day computing. Famously leading a motley group of scholars, linguists, chess champions and intelligence officers, he was credited with cracking the so-called unbreakable codes of Germany's World War 2 Enigma machine. An intense and haunting portrayal of a brilliant and complicated man, The Imitation Game follows a genius who under nail-biting pressure helped to shorten the war and, in turn, save thousands of lives. And he left us an unanswered question – did he take his own life? Also starring **Keira Knightley, Charles Dance, Matthew Goode** and **Mark Strong**.
