Report on the DCC Meeting held on May 20th

16 members of St Mary's DCC were present at the meeting which began with a celebration of the Eucharist.

Matters Arising from the previous meeting were mainly concerned with progress reports on the plans to construct a dais for a forward altar and to replace the pews with chairs. Quotations for the dais and carpeting of this and the chancel area will be obtained. Two quotations from firms to supply 200 chairs were available and an application for a faculty will be submitted now that the details of design/colour and cost are available.

A resolution that the organ loft roof be repaired with stainless steel sheeting rather than lead was passed and quotations for this work, which is covered by insurance, will be obtained.

Three compost bins have been obtained for use in the churchyard and thanks were expressed to Mr & Mrs Hunter for their working obtaining these so quickly.

Resulting from the Vicar's Report was a proposal that we hold an "Awayday" for the DCC and any interested members of the congregation on Saturday, October 25th. This will consider Worship in all its aspects.

Jane Wardman presented a progress report on the Action Plan first introduced early in 2007. With many aspects having already been put in place she described 2008 as a year of consolidation.

Correspondence included a letter relating to servicing of the church clock, a letter of thanks from Andrew Hampshire following the Outreach Committee's gift in recognition of his excellent work in looking after the winding of the church clock and a letter relating to child protection and the hiring out of church premises.

Under Any Other Business a request from Holmbridge Church for the loan of our gazebos was considered and will be negotiated by the Churchwardens.

The excellent presentation of the Church notice boards was commented upon. Notices to discourage unauthorized parking in front of the church gates were in hand.

Following the retirement of Ann Brooks as a Foundation Governor at the Infant's School the meeting unanimously confirmed the appointment of Charles Kaye as her successor. The Secretary was asked to convey our thanks to Ann for her sterling work over a number of years as a school governor.

Honley Infant and Nursery School News

The staff and children at Honley Infant and Nursery School are enjoying a very busy summer term and are looking forward to all the events and celebrations which mark the end of the school year.

Amongst this year's highlights so far have been our services in St Mary's Church. Children from Early Years and Key Stage 1 led a Harvest Service in October with songs, poetry and drama. Year 2 children led the Nativity Service at the end of term which as usual was very well attended and provided a very memorable start to the Christmas season. All of our full time children were involved in our Easter Service which included a very moving performance of the Easter Story with songs and acting performed to a very high standard.

Parents who recorded their comments in our 'Thank You Children Book' following these performances spoke of their pride and enjoyment in the achievements of the children. Comments such as these really contribute to our job satisfaction and make us realise what a privilege and a pleasure it is to work with the children at Honley Infant and Nursery School.

Our FOHIS committee have been very active this year. A successful Christmas Fayre raised an amazing £3,300 for school at the end of November, and in May we had a family walk around Honley with the reward of a cream tea in the school hall once the walk had been completed.

Our next FOHIS event will be our summer barbeque which is due to take place from 12.00 – 3.00pm on Sunday 13th July. We hope that as many parents, family, friends and members of the community as possible will join us for an afternoon of fun, games and delicious food and drink.

Other events for the rest of the year include school trips to Shibden Park, Cronkshaw Farm and the Butterfly House in Sheffield . Our year 2 children are to be involved in a twinning project with year 2 children from Fixby School. This will involve the children spending time at each others schools as well as a fun morning at the Hudawi Centre.

When the Fixby children visit us we will be taking them around Honley village to point out features of the village, including a visit to the ambulance station and to St Mary's Church. The project will end with a sports afternoon at Fixby school.

We shall say goodbye to our year 2 children at a special leaver's concert which will include the presentation of a portfolio of work containing samples of work which children have completed from their days in nursery up to the present day.

During the summer holiday major building work will be taking place to build a mezzanine floor over our hall. This will provide us with a new staffroom and a new office and allow us to extend our Early Years Unit, giving us more teaching space for our very youngest children.

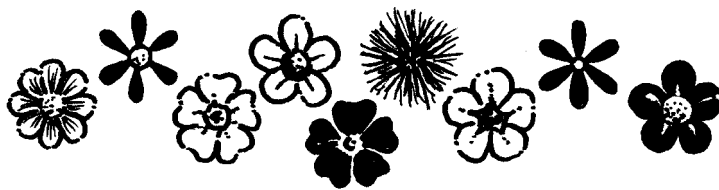

OTHER ITEMS

Summer Sun

Most people are hoping for some bright and sunny weather over the summer months, whether at home or away on holiday. Summer is a busy time for the 45,000 St John volunteers in the UK, with sunburn a common problem. It's easy to get caught out when on holiday, so here are St John's top prevention tips:

- Wear a wide-brimmed hat to protect head, face, ears and neck
- Wear loose-fitting, long-sleeved clothing
- Wraparound sun-glasses protect eyelids as well as eyes
- Children under 12 months should be kept out of the sun completely
- Have plenty of soft drinks handy and sip little and often to keep hydrated.

Olympic determination

During the Mexico Olympics (1968) a group of die-hard spectators lingered in the Olympic stadium, watching the last finishers of the marathon. An hour before, Mamo Wolde of Ethiopia had won. It was getting cold and dark and the remaining spectators were beginning to leave when suddenly, they heard the sound of a commotion. As they watched in amazement, one last runner made his way onto the track for the last lap of the race - John Stephen Akhwari of Tanzania.

As he ran the 400-metre circuit, people saw that his leg was bandaged and bleeding. He had fallen and injured it during the race, but he refused to let it stop him completely. The people remaining in the stadium rose (some in tears) and applauded him until he crossed the finishing line. As he finally hobbled away, he was asked why he had not quit since he had no chance of winning a medal.

He said simply: "My country did not send me to Mexico City to start the race, they sent me here to finish it!" What an attitude - he looked beyond the pain of the moment and kept his eye on the purpose for which he was there.

At the Olympics this summer, China will be full of athletes, all determined to finish their race. As Christians, we are also called to finish the race before us, that is to fulfil God's particular calling for us.

Heard anything good lately?

Do you talk to yourself? Apparently it is not the first sign of madness, but is actually very good for your brain and mental well-being.

New research has found that 'self-talking' can aid concentration, help solve problems and lift depressive moods. 78% of children performed simple tasks better when they spoke to themselves than when they were silent. Studies also show that talking to yourself ranks in the top three methods of coping with stress (along with singing and humming to yourself).

But while talking to yourself is good - be careful what you say! 'I can't' 'I won't' 'I'm not' won't help anyone - least of all - you!
