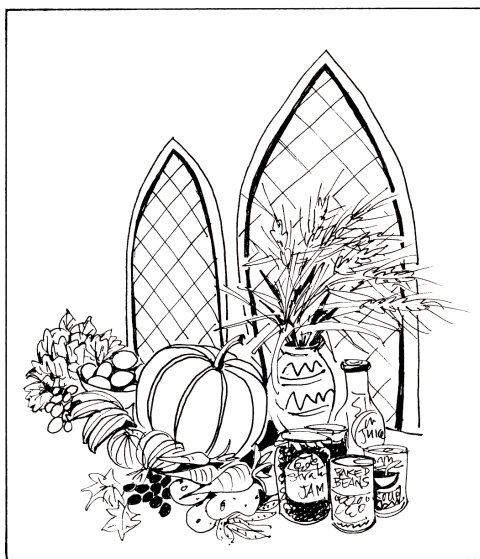

Parish Letter

October 2012

What's in a name?

The choice of a Christian name for the new baby is one of the challenges of many a father and mother. Fashions change and what was acceptable years ago is no longer, and vice versa.

Families require the continuance of certain family names in each generation. There is pressure to be "different" or to imitate the 'Celeb' of the day. A recent list of the top three names of boys and girls names indicates a return to names of yesteryear and even flowers like Poppy and Daisy which were mocked years ago. I was called Henry just because my parents liked the name!

Churches have names too and it's fascinating to work out the significance of each. It may be, as at Honley, that when the first church was built here in the Middle Ages it was the fashion to commemorate the Mother of the Lord. Or, as at Brockholes when I believe it was less of a patriotic gesture to choose the national patron saint St George but rather a recognition by Marianne Armitage who paid for the building, of the regular repetition of the name George for every first born son of the owners of High Royd.

Local celebrations have continued on the feast days of our patron saints. Honley Feast even survived the alteration of the calendar in the 18th century. Brockholes has now for several years celebrated St George's Day with AD's demonstration of the slaying of the Dragon.

But it isn't only Saint's days that give us an opportunity to show our thanks for the church, but wherever the day of the dedication is not known, then there is a special Feast of Dedication - the first Sunday in October. (This year it will be Harvest Festival; but I hope perhaps we shall at least remember it on the alternative date – the last Sunday after Trinity, i.e. 28th October).

Recently I was talking to a friend in Brockholes and I said "I have now been here for nearly fourteen years, and the church continues alive and well"; and she replied, "And I have been her for 82 years – and it's my birthday!"

This is the wonder of the church. People come and people go, but there remains, thanks to the quiet and persevering devotion and prayers of so many and their witness, a continuing life in every generation.

Thanks be to God, for our saints and our churches and for the working of the Spirit in this parish. Look out for Him as He works; not in the obvious, but in unexpected places.

Thanks be to God for St Mary, St George and all those good and holy (and mostly anonymous) people in every generation, who pass on the Faith, by who they are and Who they follow.

Report on the August Meeting of St Mary's DCC

Fourteen Members were present when Chairman Clive Waind opened the meeting with a prayer.

In matters arising from the minutes of the previous meeting Simon Dean reported that he had removed the small trees from the vicarage garden which were overhanging the neighbouring properties.

It was reported that there had been a change of buyer for the lower part of the vicarage garden and the Secretary was instructed to write to the Diocese asking them, in view of the increased sale price, if they would pay for the clearing of the upper part of the garden.

John Dean reported that the installation of the small camera giving a view of the main body of church to the organist had received positive feedback.

In the absence of Treasurer Clive Green, the Secretary was able to read out a written report supplied by Clive. This gave details of a 20% rebate on our Common Fund repayments which will be due for the duration of the interregnum so long as we pay our full Fund for 2012. The July Street Market and Flower Festival had raised £2,941. We are still on course to 'break even' over the year but Clive stressed that we have become very dependent on having a successful Street Market as our main fund-raising effort each year – this will be discussed at a future meeting. The Parish is now a Registered Charity with the number 1148443.

Jane Wardman explained recent changes in the Child Protection area. Fewer people will require CRB checks. The DCC approved the names of leaders of the groups involving children and young people who will require checks. A copy of our Child Protection Policy will be kept in the vestry. DCC approval for church activities involving children and young people was given.

Reports from the Transformational Planning Groups included the following:

- For the Community and Outreach Group Bill Kemp gave details of the concert to be given by the group “Cantorelli” on the afternoon of October 14th.
- Angeline Baker reported on the investigation into suitable Daily Bible Study guides. An ‘Emmaus’ Course in October and the Lent Course for 2013 are being prepared.
- For the Worship Planning Group Jane Wardman gave details of some forthcoming special services including the “Songs of Praise” on September 23rd and the visit of the Junior School Choir to the Family Service in November.

Under Correspondence, Clive Waind read a letter from the Welcome Centre in Huddersfield. On this subject it was pointed out that after many years of devoted service, Heather Cockhill has been forced to retire from transporting our offerings to the Centre. The Secretary was asked to write expressing our thanks to Heather.

Letters from our architect, Stuart Beaumont relating to repairs to the church tower and the reordering scheme to connect the church to the Parish Room were considered and these matters were handed to the Finance and Property Committee for their recommendations.

Any Other Business produced an up-date of matters concerning the revamping of the Bookshop by Carol Hirst, information that the Electoral Roll will be revised in 2012 and that the new list of diocesan fees for weddings and funerals is available.

Following a proposal that some recognition of Doreen Maude’s contribution to St Mary’s be recognised now that Doreen has moved to a nursing home in Nottingham it was agreed that a picture of the church might be a suitable gift and Simon Dean agreed to investigate this.

OTHER ITEMS

Are you working when you should be sleeping?

When God created the world, and everything in it, he built natural rhythms for everything to follow. The most amazing of these is the nature of time. The seasons, night and day, seed time and harvesting, and the rhythms we work to were all set in motion for us to use.

Sadly, we have become almost immune to the rhythms of life, and so we often work against them. The body has definite peaks and troughs, and we need to learn to work with these to be most productive in the day.

Most people have a peak of energy from 8.00 am – 12.00 noon, with a very definite drop, known as the post-lunch dip effect, in the afternoon. The morning is therefore crucial for doing tasks like paperwork that require concentration.

We tend to stay up way past our evening quota and as a result we have to sleep in, when in fact the early morning is a crucial time to get alone with God. If Jesus used the early part of the day to go and have fellowship with his Father then we should accept his example, and ensure we get the opportunity to start the day with communing with the Father.

It is important to look at your day and see if you are fighting your rhythms, or working with them. If when you sit in a chair for very long, you start to nod off, then you know you are suffering from sleep deprivation. If you lose most of your morning to simple tasks, then you need to review the layout of your day. Accept the reduced faculties of each afternoon, and schedule in lighter jobs then.

The Bible advises: "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven." (Ecc 3:1)

Crime Prevention Advice

As the dark evenings are here again, so are the 'Twilight Zone' burglars. Be prepared for late afternoon darkness. A house in complete darkness at teatime will stand out like a sore thumb to a would-be burglar. Your routine may be to leave home during the morning, and not arrive back until after dark in the early evening so the following is advised:

- You can create the impression that someone is at home by using a timer switch to switch on lights, a radio or TV. If you are going out for the evening, leave lights on and make the house look 'lived-in'.
- It's worth considering exterior lighting as well. Fit a low wattage lamp with a dusk to dawn sensor to an outside wall in an appropriate place.
- Visible burglar alarms will make intruders think twice. Consider a system for your home, and for the car, particularly if it is left parked outside overnight.
- Don't forget that many burglaries are committed through a rear door or window, so 'beef up' security at the back using additional good quality window and door locks.
- Make it difficult for thieves to enter your back garden. That is the most vulnerable area of your plot. Use high fencing or prickly bushes to keep them out. Don't forget to secure any gates that lead round the back.
- Sheds and garages are often neglected when it comes to security. Use strong padlocks, and if possible fasten ladders and expensive items down in the garage. You may be able to connect an alarm into the house from the garage.
- Car park thieves will be out doing their shopping for Christmas, so don't leave goods on view in the car.
- When you are out doing your Christmas shopping, beware of crowded shopping areas. With crowds come pickpockets and purse thieves. They know that people are likely to be carrying more cash than usual at this time of year.
