Please let me know how far away from home (in miles) you are prepared to travel, so I can grasp what is feasible. MWAM has been successful in discussions with Morrisons and has permission to display across Mid Wales. I will be arranging events at Newtown, Aberystwyth and Brecon during 2010.

People brought out deck chairs and picnics to watch the M1 being built, and when it opened – all 55 miles of tarmac with no speed limit – motorists descended onto it from all over the country. Over the first weekend, the AA was called out every six minutes to attend to blow-outs and wrecked big ends. Barbara Castle, opening the M5/M6 interchange in 1966, described such junctions as "the cathedrals of the modern world". But disillusion soon set in. Ecstatic day trippers gave way to traffic jams, road rage and environmental protestors.

The mention of "big ends" brought back memories. If you're about my age, whatever that may be, you'll remember that, in the old days, your car's big end going could involve huge repair bills. It was every driver's dread.

When I was a lad we used to travel a few times a year from Surrey to my grandparents in North Wales. At the time the family car was a not very new Hillman - "It cruises nicely at 40mph," my father was wont to say.

On one of these trips, somewhere in the Cotswolds, we heard an awful grinding noise from the back of the car and came to a halt. The AA man soon gave his diagnosis. He doffed his cap, bowed his head and quietly said: "I'm afraid your big end's going, sir. I'd advise you to drive slowly to the nearest garage." This turned out to be in a picturesque village whose name I've forgotten, and its owner, a quaint old chap covered in oil and smoking a clay pipe, agreed to examine the car while we went to the tearooms. It turned out to be a happy ending – no big end disaster, just a loose wire at the distributor! Great was the travellers' relief!

What happened to distributors, by the way? I was a wizard at adjusting points!
