By the end of this month we should hear whether or not we have been successful in our bid for funding from the Big Lottery Fund.

Meanwhile the fund-raising efforts and donations from the village continue and the Memorial Hall Committee acknowledges with thanks a generous donation of £50 from the Cock Inn and the proceeds from the Jubilee Tea Party at the Horse and Cart – a welcome £135.

Both of our pubs lend ongoing support to the Hall project and we are very grateful.

The Jubilee fete was never intended as a fundraiser – rather as an opportunity for the village to come together and celebrate without having to spend a lot of money. As it was, thanks to the generosity of some of our star turns (The Dog Show, the School and the Hastings Twirlers among them) we made a tiny profit of £10.66, which will also go to the Hall Fund.

Thanks again to all the unsung heroes who made the day a success.

Steps were already being taken to place a new durable bench at the bus stop by the Memorial Hall, and once the Council is satisfied that the new one serves its purpose well a second one will be ordered. Memorial Dedications from the old benches have been saved, and will be fixed to the new ones.



It was sad to learn that the Sunday football team will no longer be active next season. Not only is there a shortage of players. There are no longer enough teams in the league to make matches possible.

The good news is that a new Saturday Team will be starting up, led by Troy Sharp. Troy and his committee have been very busy and have received good support from the village and we understand there will be some "friendlies" played as soon as August.

More good news is that the annual "Veterans' Match" will take place as usual next year. This charity match in memory of two of the greatest supporters of football in our village was under threat and we are all pleased that it will continue. Also we shall be welcoming the Beckley under-15s to play their matches at Peasmarsh.

These are all good reasons to make sure our pitch stays in good condition. There is plenty of space for everyone in our Recreation Grounds. Please respect the pitch; keep your dogs off the playing field; pick up your rubbish and either take it home or put it in the bins provided.

To give everyone a chance to see the Jubilee pictures we are planning an evening at the Hall (probably in August) when everyone can come and look at them and enjoy some food and drink. Watch Village Voice and the August PP.

We are still waiting, impatiently, for the VAS at the west end of the village to be completed and activated. The latest problem is that the pole which is expected to provide the power needs to be replaced. This kind of operation on an arterial road now requires a road closure ... which requires notice Perhaps we shall have our sign by 2013!
