Minutes of the 46th Annual General Meeting of the Shropshire National Trust Centre held at Prestfelde School Shrewsbury Wednesday 18th April 2018

Miss Foster, Chairman opened the meeting by welcoming members and our President Mr David Brown.

- 1. Apologies were received from four members.
- 2. Minutes of the 45th AGM held on 12th April 2017, were accepted by the members as a true record. Proposed by Sonia Pratt, Seconded by Julia Potter.
- 3. Matters arising. None
- 4. **Chairman's Report:** This has been a very difficult year for the committee with the departure of three key members, one of whom retired at the end of 2017.

A marketing exercise to recruit new officers to the committee and to increase membership was started. We also had to look again at the walks programme as Carol had to take time out to recover from her back operation.

A new membership secretary came forward together with a newsletter editor. Two people offered to oversee and lead the walks programme provided Carol could carry out the organisation. So at least we could continue to operate but with reduced activity. We have published a new leaflet and advertised in the SYone magazine to increase our numbers and are in the process of setting up an email list of members to improve our communication.

We need more help as for the present some committee members' are having duplicate jobs. Les has taken over the website, Pat and Isobel are training to work the PowerPoint and several members are operating outings to try and raise funds.

It is good to end the year on a positive note in that we are planning new things, we want to update our communication and hope that members will look at our website where we hope to have more information. We also hope to use an email system for communication.

Throughout all this our lecture programme has been very successful and the walks programme is forging ahead.

I thank the committee for all their support throughout the year and their particular willingness to undertake more work.

Our thanks to Kevin for all his work and advice particularly with the technology, not forgetting the Newsletter and membership cards.

Thank you to Heather for taking on the membership when Pam Blofield died suddenly. Heather has done a great job supervising and managing the membership list.

We wish them happy retirement.

5. **Treasurer**: Gillian wished to thank Pat Evans of Dyke Yaxley for auditing our accounts once again. She went on to inform us of the donations we have given this year. Coastline Campaign £500, Wenlock Edge £334.08 for bird

food and £2,175.03 to Sunnycroft for stone paths, metal edging equipment and rose bushes for the garden. We had allocated £1,500 for the restoration of a Chippendale Mirror at Bentall Hall; Gerald Hume assured Gillian that the work on the restoration had been started, as at this date no invoice has been received from them, similarly Attingham has not sent an invoice for the £1,500 allocated for electrical work. Donation this year has been reduced because of losses on our lecture programme, they have ranged from £12.35 to £60.50. This year we will be donating £200 to the Coastline Campaign, £300 to Wenlock Edge for bird food and £712 to repair the canopy of the trailer used by Attingham to take parties around the grounds. Lord Antrim gave it his blessing saving that it would do no harm and could achieve some good We now have 170 Associations, Centres/Support Groups which have been instrumental in raising money for the N.T. through lectures, holidays, outings etc. At the same time this has given a great deal of pleasure to many people. David went on to say that Thelma and the committee deserve a special thank you for all the work they do. He also thanked Sonia who retired at the end of the year and to Kevin and Heather who are retiring after the AGM. He was delighted to welcome Maureen Formby and Marjorie Farnsworth who are taking on two very vital positions within the committee. David then asked the members to please support the committee, giving them encouragement by suggesting and arranging outings etc. this need not require them to join the committee but would ease the pressure on them. David was also influential in persuading Vita Gollancz to leave part of her

KIDDERMINSTER CARPET MUSEUM AND HARVINGTON HALL (Self Drive)

The carpet history is brought to life at the museum. It was a bustling industry that employed more than 12,000 people and boasted around 25 factories during its heyday. The first Kidderminster carpet was woven in 1735 and carpets made in the town have been sold in every High Street and been laid in Buckingham Palace, Downing Street and the White House.

Refreshments on arrival with a short talk, followed by our guided tour of the Museum. Taking us on a historical journey from the hand loom era to how the town's history became interwoven with that of the carpet industry. Displays and artefacts also give an insight into the lives of the people who worked on the looms.

Leaving the Carpet Museum at noon, we make our way to Harvington Hall on the outskirts of Kidderminster and reconvene in the car park at the Hall. Making our way to the small, but highly recommended tearoom for lunch, where seating has been reserved for us. Our guided tour of this wonderful medieval and Elizabethan Manor House will start at 2.15p.m. Steeped in history. Originally built in the 1300s and developed magnificently in the late 1500s, it has moats on two sides and a lake on the third side, making it ideal for concealing priests during times of persecution. It has beautiful gardens, including a formal knot garden and courtyard, a wildflower garden and floral borders.

HELP SAVE THE ONE, OF LAST OF THREE HALLIDAY'S, LEFT IN THE WORLD

One of the what?' I imagine you are asking yourself right now. Those of you who know Sunnycroft will remember the very elegant glasshouse that sits elegantly poised outside the Drawing Room window and next to the Rose Garden. It is technically a conservatory; built in 1899 and intended for the owner of Sunnycroft, Mary Jane Slaney to show off to her guests not only the building but also the specialist plants she and her head gardener grew there. It was built by the firm of R. Halliday, of Middleton near Manchester. It is in a delicate and worsening state of repair and so last year we grasped the nettle to try to begin to understand how we might best look after it.

We had a study day, including our regional Curator, Sarah Kay and national specialists for the National Trust and the council Conservation Officer. During this



we established that it is the only Halliday conservatory or glasshouse in the National Trust, it is listed grade 2 in its own right and needs a very special level of care. In fact, after a very lucky visit last summer, we also found out it is possibly one of only three left in the entire world. The visit was from a member of the Friends of Walton Hall who has spent the last few years working to research, save and

now reconstruct a much bigger Halliday glasshouse at Walton Hall in Warrington. His very thorough research has found only one other Halliday glasshouse remaining standing in the world - and it is in Geneva. The reason for this is that Halliday built glasshouses for the Rothschild family at Waddesdon in Buckinghamshire - members of the family were based in continental Europe.

Having realised we had a very special building to look after and done further research on similar projects we think conserving our conservatory may cost in the region of £150,000, which we would have to fundraise. We did feel a little daunted by this target but our project was brought to the attention of the Birmingham National Trust Centre who had been left a legacy of £73,000 which they wanted to give to a single project and they chose the Halliday!

We are in the process of appointing contractors for the initial stages of this project but it can't be completed without further fundraising. Our Archive Volunteers have done a lot of research on Mary Jane Slaney who commissioned the conservatory. It seems she was a hard working fundraiser for local causes, sitting on the school board, Vice President of Wellington Horticultural Society, Nursing Association Treasurer and many other things. At the time she was living at Sunnycroft local events included a Picnic on the Wrekin. So we're combining Mary Jane Slaney's passion for fundraising with a local event and creating a challenge we hope people will join us in - and be sponsored to do it to raise money for the conservatory.

Our challenge is this: on Wednesday 21 August we are organising a walk from Sunnycroft, all the way up to the top of the Wrekin for lunch, over the top and round and back to Sunnycroft, in time for a cream tea on the veranda at Sunnycroft. Its £20 to join in the walk and we'll be asking anyone who joins to commit to raising £50 from sponsorship, all of which will go towards the Halliday Conservatory conservation fund. If you want to sign up to do the walk you can do this from Sunnycroft's What's on events listings on our website or by



phoning $0344\ 249\ 1895$ and asking to book on the walk. Then to get your fundraising pack, including sponsorship form just call Sunnycroft direct on $01952\ 242884$. It's a bit of a two step process at the moment but we're hoping to smooth that out very soon! The fundraising pack will have lots of other ideas for raising money, which you might want to think about if you can't do the walk. Everything you do will help our Halliday, even just coming for a visit sometime soon, and we really appreciate your support.

BIG CHANGES AHEAD





After listening to various comments from members and considerable thought, the committee has decided to make the following changes, to take effect from September this year:

NEW MEMBERSHIP FEE - After more than 40 years we are increasing the membership fee to £10 per year. If you pay by standing order please advise your bank to change your payment

NEW LECTURE FEE - At the same time the fee for attending lectures will reduce to £3 per meeting

NEW VENUE - We are moving the meetings to the Trinity Centre, adjacent to the Church at Meole Brace. There is ample parking space just 50 yards from the venue
