The Marie Curie nurses provided support for the last few weeks of Doris's life and Bob said: "She got her wish and everything was right. She knew I was there and she had a lot of people coming to see her. It was fantastic and the response I've had since has been

overwhelming."

He continued: "I started the fundraising the October after she died. I was looking at her photo on the mantelpiece and I thought what can I do repay those people for what they did for her and that's why it all started."

He created a "shop" shed

in his garden and has sold plants, ornaments, kindling and logs to raise funds. More than £2,000 was raised selling plants and wreaths. A meat bingo, auction and tombola last November raised £2,100.57 and Bob hopes to raise a bumper amount this week.

Lucy Styles, Marie Curie community fundraiser said: "We can't provide care and support for people living with a terminal illness without the fantastic support of people like Bob. Marie Curie is now into its biggest fundraising campaign of the year - the Great Daffodil Appeal."
