Already a month of the New Year has passed and the growing season is getting under way. I was cutting back some brambles last week and was surprised at the new growth, dratted things.

Sadly, we have to start on another sad note as Mr Leonard Burleigh has passed away and we attended his funeral at Penmount last week. Back to fuchsias, my hardwood cuttings of *Corallina* are doing well and I now have 3 shoots at least 2" long on one 'stick'. I planted it the right way up but it has since dried up and dropped off. I guess I got the message, loud and clear....!!

Alan suggests I take 'cuttings', as opposed to a 'heel', pot them up as normal and place them in the propagator to root. Good idea, watch this space.

The standard whips are ready for distribution this evening but, as you will see, they are not so far forward this year, only approximately 8" tall and in smaller pots. He says they are from a new supplier and he has been tearing his hair out trying to get the supplies delivered. Guess the bad weather didn't help. The thing is, they had the order early enough, so why didn't they get on with it? Things just aren't what they used to be. Anyway, instructions on what to do next are on Page 5.

We have all but sold out of these and have only three varieties remaining, *Gotenborg* - 5, *Southgate* - 7, *Waltz Jubelteen* - 1. When we placed the order in September for 180 of 10 varieties, I did wonder if we would be able to sell them all. Your support is much appreciated I and hope you enjoy growing them on. Standard Whips - what to do next.

Take the plant out of its pot and check if the roots are circulating, if they are it will need potting on into the next size up. Tease out the roots a little before re-potting. Replace the cane with a stronger one and long enough to support the head when fully grown. As the cane will be protruding above the current growth, suggest you pop a stopper on the end so as not to poke your eye out! Tie the stem to the cane (supported right up into the top of the head), I use little strips of nylon stocking. They are very neat and do not cut into the stem.

A 'standard's height' is measured from the 'top of the compost', to where the 'head commences'.

According to the British Fuchsia Society specifications, these heights should be:-

Mini standard	between 6" and 10" (15cm to 25cm)
Quarter standard - Table standard	between 10" and 18" (25cm to 45cm)
Half standard	between 18" and 30" (45cm to 75cm)
Full standard	between 30" x 42" (75cm to 105cm)




