It was with great sadness that we heard of the recent death of Trevor Sutherland. Many of the older members of the band will remember his time at Farndon.

The July draw, the tenth monthly draw of the 2017 - 2018 club year took place at the Churton Village Hall on the 26th July. Our August 100 Club draw, the eleventh monthly draw of the 2017 -2018 club year, took place at the Churton Village Hall rehearsal on the 30th August. Again 73 numbers, held by 50 members of the Club, were entered in this draw. Phil Mason had a very rare first place win when his number 31 won the first prize of £73.00. Well done Phil. Joyce Kehlenbeck scooped a second monthly prize of £36.50 with her lucky number 26. The third prize went to number 65 held by Sue Frencham who collected the prize of £14.60. The September monthly draw of the Band's 100 Club was a roll up, and took place at the Churton Village Hall on the 27th September.
