Once again this year the band returned to the Holt Lodge for their annual dinner and presentations night which as always falls in late January. It has proved to be a very popular choice with the members, and once again we took over the Orchard Suite for our function, which was attended by thirty past and current members of the band, who enjoyed their slightly delayed festive celebrations. The evening offers the chairman the opportunity in his speech after the meal to reflect on the events of the previous year and he closes by presenting the various awards.

For the main presentation which is for the Bands Person of the Year, every player in the main band has the opportunity to vote in a secret ballot for the person they feel has contributed the most to the band that year. This year the very popular winner of the Bands Person of the Year secret ballot was the band's treasurer Kari Kerr, (pictured right). Kari who plays front row cornet was previously the winner in 2009 and has been the treasurer for several years.

In addition to the main Bands Person of the Year award, several years ago the chairman created additional unofficial presentations called Chairman's Bottles. These four additional presentations are presented to members he felt had also contributed something special to the band, but may not have won the main ballot. The bottles have been a very popular addition to the evening. The first recipient of a 'bottle' was Anne Reay. In actual fact her bottle was in reality a large bar of chocolate, as she does not often drink alcohol. The second winner was Roland Twydell who plays with and supports the Junior band and organises the 100 Club. The Rev. Chris Deakin also collected a bottle for his contribution to the band over the year including his much appreciated public speaking performances at several band events. Finally Deb Mason, wife of the band secretary who shared her award with her husband Phil for their joint contributions.

This year's winner of the Junior Bands Person of the Year was presented by our president Michael Trevor-Barnston at the Christmas Brass event.





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


Band Chairman's Highlights

Our jobs for this year start on Sat 8th April with a concert at St Pauls's Church, Vicarage Lane in Helsby for Ellesmere Port & District Lions. It will feature the full band and starts at 7.00 until 9.30pm. On Sat 20th May the full band returns to Bellis' Garden Centre in Holt for their

Picnic & Proms event for Nightingale House Hospice. The doors open 5.30 for a 6.00pm start. The Junior band kick off their programme for 2017 at Tattenhall Worm Festival which is held at the The Park adjacent to Tattenhall Primary School on Sat 10th June starting at 12.00 until about 3.00pm. On Wed 14th June the Juniors are out again for another concert at The Rock Chapel in Farndon. The concert is 6.30 for a 7.00pm start.

The full band travel to St Peter's Church field in Hargrave & Huxley on Sat 24th June for the Happy Days event. The starting times are to be confirmed. In a change to the traditional booking for this next event, on Sat 8th July the St Chad's Rushbearing event will feature the Junior band. The Juniors will assemble at the Vicarage for a 2.00 start. On Sat 26th August the full band have a provisional booking for the Rossett Village Festival which again will be held at Darland Sports Centre, Darland School. The Band will play from 2.30 - 4.45pm if confirmed. Another provisional booking for the full band for the Beer Festival at Farndon Community Club Sat 9th Sept.

100 Club Results

Because of the packed Christmas edition there are some outstanding 100 Club results to share with you. The 100 club continues to raise vital funds for the band and attracts a good number of followers for each monthly draw

The winners of the December monthly draw, which was the third of the 2016 - 2017 period, took place at Churton Village Hall at the rehearsal on the 15th December. In total 85 numbers held by 54 members of the 100 club were entered in this draw and the lucky winners were as follows.

The first Prize of £85.00 went to No 42 held by Joyce Kehlenbeck. The second Prize of £42.50 went to No 14 held by Kari Kerr, the treasurer of the band. Finally the third Prize of £17.00 went to No 2 which was one of Roland Twydell's numbers.

Practice Makes Perfect

Following the busy winter period, the rehearsal nights of the early months of the new year at Churton Village Hall represent an ideal opportunity to prepare the band for the Spring and Summer periods when there are many more jobs.

I spoke to the band's musical director Kelvin Redmile, for his thoughts on how he approaches this important planning period for the band.

He told me, "When preparing the band for the new year ahead the music selection is the priority for me as musical director, and in choosing music I try to understand and review each player's commitment to the band. All players, depending on their family and work commitments, offer differing level of attendance and practice, but even though whose attendance and commitment is



good there can still be various pressures and stresses in their life. So I look at a player's attendance, their likely commitment, circumstances and their musical ability. It is also important to try to appreciate a player's musical limitations but also recognize that I can often help them exceed their own expectations with the correct selection of demanding music, and hopefully the application of such musical and leadership skills that I have. Of course everyone's purpose for being in the band is primarily to enjoy themselves by playing interesting and challenging music which they enjoy and hopefully the audiences will enjoy listening to as well. So out of that, comes my choice of music, that choice is made to stretch the ability of players without demoralising them. To make sure we play music they thoroughly enjoy, and finally to balance that with what will go down well at the various events we play at. I always say to the band, "If you have enjoyed the practice, then go home happy. If you haven't, then do come and see me so we can talk about how we can change things, so that you do enjoy it".

It is a difficult challenge but Kelvin and Arial manage to keep everyone involved while preparing the band for a wide variety of jobs each year.
