FROM THE ARCHIVES

My final article this month, focuses on the National Marian Shrine, in Knock, County Mayo, Ireland. The 'Story of Knock' began on the evening of 21 August 1879 at about eight o'clock when Mary Byrne, who was from the village, was going home from church with the priest's housekeeper, Mary

McLoughlin. Mary Byrne stopped suddenly when she saw three life-size figures on the gable of the church. She ran home to tell her parents and soon others from the village gathered. The witnesses said they saw an apparition of Our Blessed Lady together with St Joseph, St John, and St John the Baptist, on the wall of the church. Behind them and a little to the left of Saint John was a plain altar. On the altar was a cross and a lamb, with angels around it. A farmer, about half a mile away from the scene, later described what he saw as a large globe of golden light above and around the gable, which was circular in appearance.

Following the apparition, miraculous cures began to be reported. The first was that of Delia Gordon, a 12-year-old girl who had been deaf and suffered horrific pain. It is said that her parents took her to the shrine where she knelt before the place where the apparition was seen. Her mother picked a piece of cement from the gable wall, blessed it, and put it on her daughter's ear. The pain went immediately, and she was no longer deaf. An ecclesiastical Commission of inquiry was established on 8 October 1879, the evidence of witnesses was taken in the ensuing months. The deliberations of the commission, referred only to the occurrence on 21 August 1879. The evidence, which was the commission's duty to record, satisfied all the members and was deemed trustworthy. During the years that followed many people claim to have been cured at Knock, and many crutches and walking sticks are left at the spot where the apparition occurred. Each Irish diocese makes an annual pilgrimage to the Shrine and, every August, the nine-day Knock novena attracts pilgrims from all over the world. Many Popes including, Pius XII, John XX111, Paul VI, John Paul II and, more recently in August 2018, Pope Francis, have visited the site. Mother Teresa of Calcutta was there in June 1993. Ireland's National Eucharistic Congress was held at the shrine in 2011, an estimated 13,000 pilgrims attended.

Though it remained for almost 100 years a major Irish pilgrimage site, Knock only established itself as a world pilgrimage site in the last quarter of the twentieth century. This was largely due to the work of its long-time parish priest, Monsignor James Horan, who presided over the major rebuilding of the site, which included a large new Basilica alongside the old church. The complex now incorporates five churches including the Apparition Chapel, Parish Church and Basilica, a Religious Books Centre, Caravan and Camping Park, a hotel, and the Knock Museum.

Monsignor Horan also secured millions of pounds of State aid from the Irish government to build a major airport near Knock. If you would like to visit Knock, Covid-19 restrictions permitting, Ryanair return flights from Liverpool in June are currently on sale for approximately $\frac{f}{20!}$ **Mike Bryan**
