From the Archives

The 1^{st,} July 2022, marked the 431st anniversary of the martyrdom of Blessed George Beesley, who was born in 1562 to a staunchly Catholic family, in a downstairs room of what is now our parish presbytery. Queen Elizabeth 1st was on the throne of England, and these were difficult and dangerous times for Catholics. In his late teens, George, who was determined to become a priest, fled this country to be trained at the seminary in Rheims. He was ordained in 1587. Shortly after becoming a priest, and despite knowing the dangers

associated with the priesthood, he returned to England. For three years he travelled around the countryside celebrating mass in the 'safe' homes of many Catholic families. However, he was soon discovered by Richard Topcliffe, a landowner, and Member of Parliament, who was notorious as one of the Crown's chief enforcers of the penal laws against the practice of Catholicism. George was imprisoned in the Martin Tower, at the Tower of London and was subsequently hanged, and his body quartered, in front of a large crowd, on Fleet Street on 1st July 1591.

Whilst in his prison cell George carved the following inscription from psalm 42, in Latin, on his cell wall: "Like the deer that yearns for springs of water, so my soul is yearning for you, God" A copy of the inscription, which is shortly to be cleaned and restored, has a central position in our church garden.

Two other Martyrs are associated with this parish, William Marsden who was born on a farm near Beacon Fell, was educated at Rivington Grammar School and then at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford. He too was ordained in Rheims but, almost immediately after coming back to England, he was discovered on the Isle of White and was martyred on 25th April 1586.

It is also thought that St John Wall may have been born close to Hill Chapel, at Chingle Hall. He became a Franciscan priest and was known as Fr. Joachim of St. Ann. Most of his time was spent at Harvington Hall, a Catholic 'safehouse', in Worcestershire. However, he was apprehended, arrested, and subsequently put to death for being a priest, on 22nd August 1679. Harvington Hall in Worcestershire is a moated manor house and has the largest number of priest hiding holes in the country; it is well worth a visit. See http://www.harvingtonhall.com

In 1849, the year when the Catholic Hierarchy was restored in the U.K., Fredrick William Faber wrote the hymn, 'Faith of Our Fathers', in memory of those Catholic men and women martyred during Tudor times. Today, we are so fortunate to be able to attend mass freely and without restriction. This is due, in no small part, to those martyrs who were willing to sacrifice their own lives to preserve and maintain the Catholic faith in this country, a precious freedom we must practise and uphold.
