#### From the Archives

As we move into the fifth week of Lent, I wonder how many of us are still keeping to our Lenten promises? We are blessed in that we have the freedom to choose how we prepare for Holy Week and Christ's glorious

resurrection on Easter Sunday. By contrast, this year, the Christian population in Ukraine have no such freedom. Mariupol, the city dedicated to Our Blessed Lady, has almost been totally destroyed and hundreds of ordinary men, women and children have had their lives turned into a living nightmare. As we witness the terrible atrocities that are happening in the country, we can't fail to be impressed by the tremendous faith that is displayed by those who have lost everything. The Orthodox religion is obviously extremely important to the Ukrainian people and must give them tremendous hope as they face a most uncertain future.

The Russian Orthodox Church is the main religion of Ukraine. It is a self-governing Orthodox body that is represented by one of five great patriarchates in the Orthodox Church. Russian Orthodox bishops preside over distinct geographic areas, with each responsible for leading the church in his region. The Russian Patriarch is, therefore, one among equals with the other patriarchs, with none having ecclesiastical authority over the other. Whilst our Roman Catholic Church has a similar hierarchical structure to the Russian Orthodox Church, in contrast, the Holy Father has authority over the entire Church. Other Christian denominations in the west have a variety of models from a hierarchy, with bishops, to the fundamental independent Baptist Church that does not recognise any central authority whatsoever.

There are many similarities between Christians in both the East and the West. Both share a common belief in the Trinity, the resurrection, and the divinity of Christ. They recognise a common baptism and communion; both have the same seven sacraments, although in the Orthodox Church confirmation is called 'chrismation'. While there are some slight differences in ritual and meaning between Orthodox and Catholics, these sacraments are essentially compatible.

There are, however, differences in the religious calendar between Russian Orthodox and Western Christians. Christmas and Easter are both celebrated at different times in Russian Orthodox churches than they are in Western churches. The Russian Orthodox Church uses the old Julian calendar, whereas the Roman Catholic Church switched to the Gregorian calendar in the 16th century. This year Easter Sunday in Ukraine will be on 24 April. Like many countries in Eastern Europe, Ukrainians normally celebrate Easter with decorated eggs, special foods, and customs. Throughout the day people exchange Easter eggs, kiss each other on the cheek three times, and often say 'Christ is risen!' to each other, responding with 'He is truly risen!' A lovely tradition that we pray will continue this year.
