The money has been sent to Cafod who have their sister organisation – Caritas Ukraine – already working over in Ukraine, helping people affected by the conflict.

From the Archives

I am sure that at this very tragic and catastrophic time in Europe, the Ukrainian people and the plight they are undergoing, are at the centre of all our thoughts and prayers. At the time of writing, Russian troops have just advanced into the capital city of Kyiv and many innocent lives have already been lost. It is very sad to think that the lessons of history have not been learned and that man's inhumanity to man continues in such a brutal and totally unnecessary manner.

At the conclusion of last Sunday's Angelus prayers in St Peter's Square, Pope Francis directly addressed President Putin for an end to the invasion of Ukraine that has devastated several cities in the European nation. The Holy Father implored Mr. Putin, "In the name of God, I ask you: stop this massacre!" He noted the devastation wreaked by Russian forces in the Ukrainian city of Mairupol, named after the Virgin Mary, whom his congregation had just petitioned in the Angelus prayers. The Pope said, "We have just prayed to the Virgin Mary. This weekend, the city that bears her name, Mariupol, has become a city martyred by the ruinous war that is devastating Ukraine. Faced with the barbarism of the killing of children, and of innocent and defenceless citizens, there are no strategic reasons that hold up: the only thing to be done is to cease the unacceptable armed aggression before the city is reduced to a cemetery. With an aching heart I join my voice to that of the common people, who implore an end to the war. In the name of God, let the cries of those who suffer be heard and let the bombings and attacks cease! Let there be a real and decisive focus on negotiation and let the humanitarian corridors be effective and safe." A very powerful statement echoing the thoughts and prayers of all God-loving people throughout the world.

Ukraine is the seventh-largest nation in Europe and the second largest among the East Slavs after Russia. It has a population of 44.3 million and a land mass of 233,062 square miles. Approximately seventy percent of the population are Orthodox Christians and a large percentage of these attend church regularly. In normal times, the economy of Ukraine could best be described as an emerging free market. Although agriculture still plays an important role in the country's economy, manufacturing is now the largest provider of employment and wealth across the nation. It is interesting to note that Ukraine has one of the largest natural gas reserves in the world, estimated at 1.1 trillion cubic meters. It is among the major mineral producers in the world, boasting over 7,500 different deposits containing some 90 individual minerals. It has also recently developed a complete cycle of aerospace production. Perhaps not surprising, therefore, to see the attraction of the country to President Putin, a power-hungry, ruthless Russian dictator eager to turn the clock back to the days of the USSR.

I end this article with Pope Francis's prayer for peace in Ukraine:

Lord God of peace, hear our prayer! Open our eyes and our hearts and give us the courage to say: "Never again war!" With war everything is lost. Instil in our hearts the courage to take concrete steps to achieve peace. Keep alive within us the flame of hope, so that with patience and perseverance we may opt for dialogue and reconciliation. In this way may peace triumph at last. Amen.'
