From the Archives

A Very Happy Easter! Whilst Easter Sunday is the most important day in the Christian calendar it is celebrated in many different ways around the world, ranging from the traditional religious services and rituals to the commercialised activities that have become more prevalent in recent years.

Many traditions, like the giving of Easter eggs, are symbolic of the new life given to us through Christ's glorious resurrection. Others are simply fun activities to celebrate the end of Lent and enjoy the coming of spring. If you have always celebrated Easter in the same way, it can be difficult to imagine that the holiday's traditions are different anywhere else. For example, in Bermuda celebrating Easter is a weekend affair of kite flying. People who want to celebrate go to Horseshoe Bay Beach to show off and fly their homemade kites, which are often brightly coloured with bold geometric designs. In Guatemala the streets are covered with colourful carpets made from flowers, fruits, vegetables and sand. They depict religious scenes, and many are half a mile long. A grand procession is held on Good Friday.

In 1991, rabbit free Australia launched a campaign to replace the Easter bunny with the Easter bilby, or rabbit-eared bandicoot. In Australia, rabbits are widely considered to be pests which destroy crops and land. A more dramatic tradition takes place in Florence where locals celebrate a 350-yearold Easter tradition known as Scoppio del Carro, or "explosion of the cart." An ornate cart packed with fireworks is led through the streets of the city to the 'Duomo', the cathedral of Florence. Then, during the Easter Day mass, the Archbishop of Florence lights a fuse that leads outside to the cart and sparks a lively fireworks display. Apparently, the meaning behind this custom dates back to the First Crusade, and is meant to ensure a good harvest.

For food lovers, in the southern French town of Haux on Easter Monday a giant omelette is cooked and served in the town's main square. The giant omelette uses more than 15,000 eggs and feeds up to 1,000 people. Legend has it that, when Napoleon and his army were travelling through the south of France, they stopped in a small town and ate omelettes. Napoleon liked his so much that he ordered the townspeople to gather their eggs and make a giant omelette for his army the next day.

I end with the words of Pope Francis in his Easter address last year, "Dear Brothers and Sisters, a good, happy, and peaceful Easter! Today, throughout the world, the Church's proclamation resounds: Jesus, who was crucified, has risen, Alleluia!" Mike Bryan
