From the Archives

Whilst the schools are closed for the summer break many of you will be trying hard to find ways and means of keeping young ones occupied and entertained. In the past, before the advent of television, computer tablets and phones, board games were extremely popular and played widely throughout the world.

Whilst many of the board games we play originated in ancient times, they evolved into their current form over the centuries, but especially in the Victorian period. It is widely thought that the term, 'board games', originated in Tudor England. Much of the furniture at that time, would have been made using oak boards, or wood which was obtained locally. In the homes of the wealthy, furniture was highly ornate, carved, and heavy, for others, simple wooden boards were screwed or nailed together to make 'sideboards' and 'cupboards'. Tables had tops made of boards which could be used for dining then, after a meal, turned over to play board games. An interesting thing to note is that board games which required the moving of pieces along a path were created using some type of "spinner" apparatus. Dice were not considered appropriate as they were associated with gambling.

Backgammon is believed to have originated in Mesopotamia in the Persian empire and is the oldest known recorded game in history. It was originally played on surfaces made of wood using stones as markers and dice made from bones, stones, wood, or pottery. The game was especially popular in English taverns until the 15th century when Chess surpassed it. Besides being one of the oldest skill games, chess is also a history lesson in miniature of medieval times. The way the board is set up using six different pieces, is representative of medieval times with its many ceremonies, grandeur, and wars. Pawns are representative of serfs or labourers. During the medieval period, serfs were considered property or chattel of the landowners. Serfs worked hard and often died young. They were not protected during wars and could be traded or sacrificed to protect their "owners" from harm. The castle represents the home of the Lord of the Manor and should always be protected. The knight was the professional soldier whose job it was to protect persons of rank. The Knights are more important than pawns, but less important than the other pieces and were also considered sacrificial. The bishop represents the church. The church was a powerful force in medieval times and religion played a key role in every person's life. The queen represents the only woman and is the most powerful piece in the game. However, during medieval times, a queen often found herself in a powerful, yet precarious position. The king is the tallest piece on the board and the best protected. During medieval times, the surrender of the king meant the loss of their kingdom and guite often a change for the worse. It was to everyone's best interests to see to it that the king was kept from harm.

Possibly the best-known British manufacturer of card and board games is John Waddington of Leeds, Ltd. The company was founded in the mid-19th century and is still operating today; two of its most popular games are Monopoly and Cluedo. When did you last play a board game?
