From the Archives

As we are now just a week away from Christmas Day, I thought it would be interesting to write about the origins of one of the best known Christmas Carols, with which you will all be very familiar. 'Silent Night', is sung in countries around the world and in 2011 it was declared an 'intangible cultural heritage' by UNESCO.

The carol was first performed on Christmas Eve 1818 at St Nicholas parish church in Oberndorf, a village in the Austrian Empire on the Salzach river, which is now in present-day Austria. A young priest, Father Joseph Mohr, had come to Oberndorf the year before. He had written the lyrics of the carol "Stille Nacht" in 1816 but had been unable to decide upon a melody to accompany them. In 1818, Fr.

Mohr brought the words to Franz Xaver Gruber, schoolmaster and organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf. Fr. Mohr asked Gruber to compose a melody, to be used for the first time at the Christmas Eve mass using his words. Unfortunately, legend has it that on Christmas Eve night the organ in the small church had been damaged by rodents which had eaten through the leather pipes. Not wishing to disappoint, Gruber performed the new carol playing the melody on guitar. The carol was so popular with the congregation, other parishes in the Alpine region soon adopted it and its fame quickly spread throughout Europe and beyond. The song has now been translated into about 140 different languages and recorded by many singers from every music genre. Episcopalian priest John Freeman Young wrote the English translation. It is this translation that is most popularly sung today. He translated it from three of Mohr's original six verses. The version sung by Bing Crosby remains the third best-selling single of all-time!

A direct translation of the first two verses of the original carol is slightly different to the now familiar translation you will no doubt know off by heart. Try to sing it yourself:

Silent night! Holy night!

All are sleeping, alone and awake

Only the intimate holy pair,

Lovely boy with curly hair,

Sleep in heavenly peace!

Sleep in heavenly peace!
