From the Archives

This week I continue to focus on the plight of Catholics during penal times when anyone caught practising the catholic faith faced arrest and possible execution. Despite this very real threat, Catholicism in the area continued to thrive. Many young Catholic men travelled to the continent to be ordained a priest, knowing that when they returned, they faced being tracked down and arrested by a large network of spies, or 'Watchers' as they became known, working on behalf of Queen Elizabeth I. Keen to preserve the supremacy of Protestant Church of England. the queen herself, was under threat from a series of Catholic plots to replace her with the Catholic Mary Queen of Scots.

As a great-granddaughter of Henry VII of England, Mary had once claimed Elizabeth's throne as her own and was considered the legitimate sovereign of England by many English Catholics, including participants in a rebellion known as the Rising of the North. Perceiving Mary as a threat, Elizabeth had her confined in various castles and manor houses in the interior of England. After eighteen and a half years in captivity Mary was found guilty of plotting to assassinate Elizabeth and was beheaded in 1586 at Fotheringhay Castle. Mary's life and subsequent execution established her in popular Catholic culture as the legitimate sovereign and, as such, Elizabeth found herself still in danger from Catholic plotters. Those working on her behalf became even more determined to hunt down Catholic priests and those found protecting them. For many years Robert and William Cecil controlled this spy network on behalf of the queen. Another crucial figure was Sir Francis Walsingham, who ran the Secret Service as well as serving as Secretary of State during times of international conflict, including the Spanish Armada. However,

perhaps one of the most interesting of Elizabeth's famous spies was John Dee. When spying from the Spanish Court, Dee signed each private letter to Elizabeth with the insignia '007'; later to be borrowed by Ian Fleming in his creation of James Bond.

The impact of Elizabeth's spy masters was felt most severely in Lancashire where thirty-four Catholics where martyred for their faith, seventeen of these perished at Lancaster Castle. Amongst them were two priests with a close connection to Goosnargh, Fr. Thomas Whittaker and Fr Germanus Helme.

Fr Whittaker was born in Burnley to a Catholic family closely related to the Townleys. He studied for the priesthood at Valladolid and, on his return, worked for five years serving Catholic families in the Goosnargh and Claughton areas. He was arrested at Blacke Hall, Langley Lane, in Goosnargh, but escaped whilst being conducted to Lancaster. He was again seized by the 'Watchers' and spent six weeks in solitary confinement before being executed at Lancaster Castle. He was beatified alongside George Beesley in November 1987. Fr Germanus Helme, served as a Franciscan priest at White Hill, and he was also the first resident priest at Lee house in Thornley.

After the 1745 Jacobite rebellion, there was a renewed attack against Lancashire Catholics, who were accused of supporting the Stuart rebels. A mob came out and arrested Fr Helme at Lee house and he was taken to the dungeons at Lancaster Castle where he died after four months of extremely harsh treatment and deprivation. He is reputedly the most recent of England's martyrs, dying for his faith in 1746. His ghost is reputed to have been seen in our own presbytery at Hill Chapel!
