Children and their parents have met monthly and parents have worked with their children, with the support of the catechist, to help them prepare for these two special sacraments. From the Archives

As today is Family Mass Day, I thought it appropriate to look back to 1880 when our school at 'The Hill' was first opened.

The Elementary Education Act 1870, commonly known as Forster's Education Act, set the framework for compulsory schooling of all children between the ages of 5 and 12 in England and Wales. Prior to 1870, there was no national system of education and only a small section of the child population received any schooling. Opportunities for a formal education were restricted mainly to town grammar schools, charity schools, private fee-paying schools, and 'finishing' schools for young ladies. During the eighteenth century the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge, a protestant charity, created schools for the poor in the 7 to

11 age range. It is from these schools that the modern concept of primary and secondary education has grown. The SPCK also concerned itself with the training of teachers which introduced a sense of professionalism to teaching young children.

Following the passing of the 1870 Education Act, the Catholic authorities began to build parish schools specifically to teach the Catholic faith alongside a basic curriculum of reading, writing and arithmetic – the 'The Three R's', as it became known. As there was no Catholic school in the Goosnargh area, the Benedictine Order asked the then Parish Priest, Fr. M. Brierley O.S.B., to raise funds to build a parish school. The plan was to build a small two classroom school close to the presbytery for local Catholic children, many living in the nearby farms. The school would be open five days a week but would close for an hour at midday so that the children could go home for lunch. Two teachers would be employed and would be paid from parish funds. It is clear from the archives that Fr Brierley was concerned that the expense of such a project would put a tremendous financial burden not only on the parishioners but also on his own limited finances. On August 12th, 1880, he wrote the following letter to the Bishop of Liverpool:

"I have been ordered by my superiors to provide a school for the children of this district and, in doing so, I have incurred expenses which my ordinary income cannot meet. Will you kindly permit me to add your name to the enclosed list of subscribers to the school fund? I need not tell you, that any help you may give me will be very welcome." M Brierley

The bishop sent £5 which was put with the £15. 4s. 4d. donated by other subscribers. To date I cannot find any record of the actual cost of building the school in 1880, but I doubt £20 would cover it! Nevertheless, the school did open in September 1880 and, for the next 113 years was known as 'The Hill R.C. School'. It was not until September 1993, when Mrs M. Barron was headteacher, that the name was officially changed to,' St. Francis R.C. Primary School, The Hill'.
