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Alan writes

Change

I don't think any of us like change. We become comfortable with things the way we know them.

Some years ago I went on a year long, weekly Person Centred Counselling course for ministry based at a local college. The course was not remarkable, but the people on it were. I became friends with a recovering heroin addict (training to become a counsellor) who had managed to free himself from the addiction using the 12 step programme developed by Alcoholics Anonymous (I've had a few over the years in my churches). He had a unique way of looking at the world based on this (recognising that addiction is greater than you are and being humble enough to recognise when you need help).

One of the rules he taught me sounded bleak - "people never change until **the pain** of staying where you are is greater than the pain of changing". I wanted to say "what about the challenge of new things, what about the hope of starting again?......." The rule is bleak because it says that it is pain which motivates us more than hope.

I must say that my friendship with him changed the way that I saw my ministry, and though it hurt me to recognise this, I looked at the (5) churches in my split pastorate and had to admit that what was true for a recovering heroin addict was in some ways also true for upstanding God fearing folk in church. No-one likes to change.

COVID has affected all sections of society, it has taken churches and shaken them to the core and even here in Annan we have lost folk who passed away with COVID.

I cannot see all of the consequences for our church of the epidemic, but we are in a place where over the next few months we will take decisions we probably would not have taken without COVID, we are beginning a journey together looking at trusteeship, utilising the resources tied up in the manse and possibly employing a Community Outreach Worker (something I first did over 10 years ago). But I would finally have to disagree with my friend. Yes change is inevitable and necessary, but it is not all about pain, it is (as my first instinct said) also about joy and hope for the future.

When I was a young child in church we used to sing a chorus, perhaps you know it?

"I know who holds the future and he will guide me with His hand, with God things don't just happen, everything by Him is planned".....

We go together.
