INTERIM MINISTER'S LETTER AUGUST 2023

Dear Friends,

The world we live in seems to be challenged in so many ways. At the time of writing this I am glad I have not invested in an expensive holiday in Italy as I cannot tolerate extreme temperatures. My discomfort though is irrelevant when we think of how soaring temperatures caused by climate change are destroying lives and livelihoods. Then we have the escalating war in Ukraine and the volatile situation in Palestine and Israel. August is also the month when we are reminded of the 109th anniversary of the start of the First World War when Germany declared war on France. It seems sometimes how little we have learned in those 109 years. The war in Ukraine has many similarities with the horrors of World War One. When you consider that Russia has lost already 50,000 men, the human implications hit home. The use of cluster bombs by both sides can only accentuate casualties. There are those who see in all that is going on signs that the end of the world is nigh. I don't myself go along those lines but would readily accept that every living human being on our planet needs to refocus their lives with God's help.

Where is God in all this people ask? God is suffering with all of us because for many people sadly they cannot accept any blame or responsibility for our present state of affairs because it is so much easier to pick a scapegoat and that makes them feel better.

Our Gospel readings during August come from Matthew's Gospel and help us to really focus on where we should place God in our lives. On the 6th August in the feeding of the five thousand we see Jesus emphasising compassion through hospitality. On the 13th August in the incident of Jesus walking on water we are reminded that Jesus is with us in the stormy times of life if we let him into our life. The 20th August brings the story of the unclean woman and reminds us that as Christians the marginalised and the excluded need to be remembered and helped. The 27th August reminds us to think about how Jesus as the Son of God can and does make a difference in our lives if only we can show confidence in our Saviour.

For many people Jesus or God are a last resort, not the first port of call when we have an issue to cope with. That can be understandable if you look at the situation in Ukraine where the Christian Church in its different denominations appears to support both sides! If we think about it carefully though, God cares for everyone even when that person is doing something ungodly. God weeps with all who suffer even if they have brought that suffering on themselves.

Each one of us is made in God's image but sadly we so often fight God because we decide what we want for our own interests not those of God. We also want God to fit our own image and wishes. As I grow older I suppose I realise how important it is that we trust in God and listen for God rather than try to mould God into fitting into our own created life plan.

#### **HOW DO WE REACH OUT?**

Some months ago, Reform Magazine ran an article about Community Project Awards and how the URC at Roker in Sunderland had followed advice and planning by a Church-Related Community Worker. She suggested that the church, which has 24 members, develop links with trusted partners – local enterprises that were trying to help the community too.

These partners included Social Chef, which helps people improve their well-being through food-based activities and improved diet and also Waste Not workshops aimed at reducing household waste. Another partner runs activities combatting social isolation, including exercise classes for people with long-term health conditions and disabilities and a craft class. All these build relationships with and between people in the local community.

As a result of these partnerships growing the different organisations and activities work together in the church building which offers a warm space. An Elder at Roker believes their experience shows smaller churches how to have a bigger impact - a partnership with like-minded people could be beneficial for the community. He says our building is a place people want to come to. So make use of it and work with the right people to deliver. Don't think you've got to do it on your own.
