INTERIM MODERATOR'S DECEMBER 2023 LETTER

If I were not a minister it would seem strange to be writing this letter about Advent and Christmas because the commercial world has been hyping up Christmas since the beginning of August. In my volunteer work at an Oxfam Shop in Dumfries, our manager, who happens to be the son of a Church of Scotland Minister, has had a mild rebuke from his regional office for not having all the Christmas Windows decorated and up and running by November 1st!

That leads me on to reflect on why we have in all the major Christian denominations the period known as Advent. It is about far more than giving late last-minute shoppers like me time to get elusive presents that might actually be useful to the recipients. Yes we all have the target to reach of celebrating the birth of our Saviour Jesus Christ but there is more to it than just planning a wonderful celebration and spreading goodwill to all on one significant day of the year.

First, Advent signifies starting a new year in our Study through the weeks of God's Word for us found in the Bible. Each year a key Gospel forms the background framework for us. December 3rd signifies the beginning of a study of Mark's Gospel. The First Sunday of Advent looking at Mark 13 verses 24 -37 gets us thinking about how ready we are for the coming of Jesus. That has little to do with presents and gifts and rather more about how we conduct our lives and relationships with people and the environment around us. There is climate change, war, poverty and selfishness to contend with. Advent in its first week though contains the important message of hope. God wants desperately to guide us towards the kind of world Jesus on his first visit came to show us.

The Second Sunday of Advent, 10th December, in the first 8 verses of Chapter 1 of Mark's Gospel we meet another person waiting for something to happen - namely John the Baptist who was waiting for Jesus, to see the man who was to change the World.

The Third Sunday of Advent, 17th December, looks at John 1. We see the religious leaders beginning to quake in their boots so to speak trying to comprehend who the Messiah is. They deeply question John but he diverts them to the person for whom he is a warm up act.

The Fourth Sunday of Advent introduces us in Luke 1 verses 26-38 to Mary who answers the call to become the mother of Jesus. An amazing risk-taking operation for an unmarried girl. It makes us think far more about the whole set of circumstances in which Jesus came to live among us.

Christmas Day is a true day of celebration when we realise Jesus came not for the select or any particular race of people but for all of humanity.

We round off the calendar year on New Year's Eve with Mary and Joseph taking baby Jesus to the Temple, in Luke 2 verses 22-40 to comply with Church Law and he meets two old people, Simeon and Anna, who are witnesses to who he is and how he has come to save the human race. Here for me is the evidence of the hope that our celebration of the birth of Jesus brings.

Advent, then, has a number of elements to it; waiting, preparing, celebrating, hoping and thanksgiving. It gives time to look back at the past year and to prepare to do better with God's guidance in the New Year to come.

Janet and I wish you all a very happy Christmas and thank all of you for your continuing support of Annan URC and its Elders in all that the Church tries to do to support the local community and the wider URC.


