The Essence of Prayer

Was it not wonderful news that the United Nations Secretary General and diplomats from Turkey had managed to broker an agreement between Russia and Ukraine to allow the millions of tons of grain in store in Ukraine to be transported across the Black Sea for distribution throughout the world. This was particularly important for the impoverished countries of the world like Somalia who depend on grain from places like Ukraine to feed their populations. It seemed some of our prayers had at long last been answered. Then just one day later we seemed in danger of going back to square one when Russia organised a missile strike on the port of Odesa (sometimes spelt Odessa)

It set me thinking about the passage in Luke's Gospel chapter 11 verses 1-13 where Jesus gave teaching on prayer. Prayer is something for all ages but humanity often seems to tie itself up in knots about something which should not be at all contentious.

What then are the secrets of success of prayer?

The first is that we need to have faith in a loving God who knows our needs and who enjoys in responding. It means trusting God and being ready to be open and honest about ourselves. I would add to that it is about doing something ourselves within our own capacity. So for example praying for our fellow citizens who cannot afford food to feed their families doesn't mean leaving it only in God's hands but if we can afford it we should contribute to a local Foodbank or food cooperative like Katie's Kitchen.

Secondly prayer is not about being clever. Rather it is concerning praying in a simple manner and not necessarily in perfect conditions. We can pray to God at anytime and anywhere. God likes direct and honest prayers.

Thirdly is a bit of a conundrum. Why bother to pray at all if as we believe God knows everything about us? We pray because we want God's will to be done rather than what we often think God should be doing. Then within this third point is the simple question why do prayers fail. It isn't necessarily because they lack sincerity but often because we are not putting the matter in God's hands but simply telling God what to do to satisfy our requirements. Also prayers can fail because we require God to take action within our time constraints ignoring God's time.

How often for example does the Christian Church decide that God's purpose is to satisfy our needs, match up to our expectations and to only bother us when we need God. You cannot turn God on and off like a water tap. Prayer is about remembering that God is with us both in the good times as well as the bad times. Also we have to remember that God cannot be contained like a genie in a bottle. God has the capacity to annoy us, to challenge us. When we consider the challenges of our world today God is challenging us in the traditional Christian churches to wake up before it is too late.

God challenges us in ways we really don't like at all. We reserve the right to shut God out especially if the message is one we don't want to hear. A praying community is one which shares God's ideal of harmony, interdependence and mutuality. This concept is hard for us humans because our chosen nature is to cherry pick. The truly amazing thing is that as the Theologian Gerard Hughes describes it we have a God of surprises. A God who doesn't give up on us when we are a success story and ignore God or treat God with contempt. God is especially there to pick us up when we are overconfident and trip or fall.

Prayer reassures us of a God of hope even when the earthly parameters tell us the chips are down. God doesn't lose patience, even where, as must be the case we fail to learn from our mistakes.

Prayer to me defeats the idea that we cannot have a proactive God. Prayer reminds me so often that God is actually hounding me to follow the right path and not to follow the human path of self-interest.

A praying Community is one which achieves so much because it understands it has that indefinable power of the Holy Spirit strengthening and inspiring it to share God's love with others.

Dear Friends,

Is anyone back to normal?

After two years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can now worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its likely effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK. Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Heb. 13 v.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and those churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (*if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do – it helps your treasurer significantly*) may have seen a 20%+ drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the M&M Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure the M&M Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000 (less than one-half of one percent of income), a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.
