## Welcome the Stranger

The definition of a refugee is a person who has a well-founded fear of being persecuted because of their race, nationality, religion or political opinion. War in the Ukraine highlights thousands of people who leave their homes to escape persecution and oppression, despairing of being able to put down roots as their life's foundations crumble.

Jesus was a refugee! This is a fact we don't often think about and certainly not as Easter is celebrated. Joseph obeyed the message from the angel and took his family to Egypt to escape Herod's decree to murder children. Shelter and safety is the goal of every refugee.

## **Synod Meeting**

Douglas Maxwell attended this two-day Synod meeting via Zoom. The following report has been published in the latest edition of the Synod of Scotland E-news. ### The National Synod of Scotland September Meeting

The National Synod of Scotland met in Helensburgh United Reformed Church and online on 11th-12th March. In his opening address the Moderator, Revd Paul Whittle, asked what it means to be the church today as we celebrate the Jubilee of the URC but also consider the global context of the pandemic, climate crisis and war. He encouraged us to look to the Synod Aspirations and particularly the desire to celebrate God's unconditional love, the challenge of inclusivity and the counter- cultural nature of radical love and invited Synod to engage more deeply with the aspirations. Much of the business concerned clarification on the roles and responsibilities of Synod Trustees, the Synod Executive and Area Council, together with some thinking on Committee structures. All but one of the proposed resolutions passed and further work is now possible to find people to serve in the revised structures.

The Pastoral Committee introduced a new scheme, 'Our Church, Our Faith, Our Work' which replaces Local Mission and Ministry Review. This will involve church visits, working with the Synod team and Mission Action Planning to enable congregations to develop their life. Unlike LMMR this is a voluntary scheme and will involve ministers and congregations working together.

A resolution asking the Joint Public Issues Team to work on a campaign on fuel poverty was brought by the Church and Society Committee and the Ecumenical and Interfaith task group brought a further resolution proposing Ecumenical Guidelines for the Synod, both of these were passed. Synod also noted the appointment of Duncan Walker as Synod Treasurer.

Synod will meet again on Saturday 17th September.

#### ANNAN URC - STAY SAFE AND PROTECT OTHERS

As of the 21<sup>st</sup> March some of the Covid-19 Regulations have changed, however the Synod Moderators have issued the following guidance to all United Reformed Churches. (This statement was issued prior to the Scottish Government announcement of 15<sup>th</sup> March 2022)

'Although regulations have changed and the current rate of infections is showing signs of easing, infection rates remain high across the United Kingdom. We would therefore urge the continued use of face coverings in churches, including during singing, as well as maintaining good hand hygiene and appropriate physical distancing.'

Therefore for your **own safety** as well as for **others** it is recommended that we continue to wear a mask at all times whilst inside the church premises until at the very least early April. (Subject to next Scottish Government announcement)

It is also recommended that we continue to wear face coverings whilst singing hymns.

We will continue to use the one-way system at present in operation throughout the church.

Entry to church is by the MAIN DOOR unless of course you require to use the ramp access.

On arrival, please observe the one metre rule until admitted & when on the premises

On entry you will be asked to sanitize your hands.

Entry into the sanctuary is by the door opposite the John Tweddle Room.

In an emergency or to use the toilet, please contact a steward.

Households are allowed to sit together, but it is recommended that there be at least one empty seat between household groups and individuals from separate households.

The only available toilet is the Disabled Toilet adjacent to the ramp. It must be sanitized after each use by the user prior to them leaving it.

We are serving tea & coffee during fellowship time after the service. We would ask you to please at the end of the service move to the tables & chairs provided, speedily & sit & wait while your drink is brought to you.

We also recommend that you continue to wear a face covering & that you observe 1metre social distancing whilst moving about the church & whilst seated for refreshments, face coverings may be removed when you are having your refreshments but they should be fitted once you have finished your drink.

Please leave the sanctuary by using the door marked exit & leave the church building by way of the side door at the ramp.

If you have an offering for church funds please leave it in the bowl which can be found next to the exit door.
