#### **Interim Minister's Letter February 2023**

By the time you read this edition the church will have already experienced its first warm hub meeting in the Hall on a Thursday Morning. We have agreed to review this new venture after a month but hopefully and prayerfully it will fit in with what we are asked to do in our Sunday morning readings and that is help revitalise our communities.

Our reading from Matthew 5 verses 13 -20 on the 5<sup>th</sup> of February demands of us to be proactive not reactive. It reminds me very much of a conversation that I had many years ago when I was training for Ministry with a fellow student. He attended one of those mega Baptist Churches. We were talking about different styles of pastoral care. He was full of admiration for the URC style of pastoral care that each regular attender really mattered because in his large church of over 400 regulars they didn't worry about somebody leaving because there was always, it seemed, someone else appearing to take their place.

Matthew wants us to be a light to the world following the guidance of Jesus. I take this opportunity to thank sincerely all those who took part in the sandwich outreach over the Christmas holidays. Although we discovered that this was not something the recipients it was designed for wanted it did establish clearly that we have a number of people who like to see us actively working in the community for those more vulnerable to the vicissitudes of the challenging world we find ourselves in. Matthew puts across well the desire of Christ to see his followers actually practising what he preaches.

Many of us will say I am too old and disabled to do much in the community but when it comes down to it we need to rethink that philosophy because it is possible to work in the community without huge physical or monetary outlay. For example, the warm hub idea involves us in making beverages and being ready to engage with other people in conversation. Jesus didn't want followers who listened but followers who implemented his ideas in their own inimitable style.

Later in the month we look at another aspect of the teaching of Jesus and that is found in Matthew 5 verses 21 -37 which stresses what qualities a follower of Jesus needs. It particularly focuses on an aspect which we don't find difficult fortunately. Namely being in category of a follower who is in for the long term not the short term. To achieve that though requires more than just stamina it is about seeing things through and working together to support each other particularly if one of us is especially downbeat.

The 19<sup>th</sup> of February tackles that momentous event called the Transfiguration. To really comprehend that requires of us an ability to really feel close to the God we love and adore. Transfiguration takes us beyond our normal comfort zones. It is something that for me at least shows me the exciting reasons for trying to be a faithful person.

On the 26<sup>th</sup> of February in Matthew 4 verses 1-11 we look at a really challenging aspect of faith and that is summed up in one simple word temptation. It is very easy to go off track in our faith because following a faith journey is not so to speak "a walk in the park" but rather something which requires dedication and persistence. It is worth it because I have over the years found that the easy option of following temptation is never as satisfying as trying to be a dedicated follower of Jesus. With every blessing
