INTERIM MODERATOR'S LETTER JANUARY 2024

Dear Friends,

A warm welcome to the first issue of 2024. A New Year brings conflicting thoughts for many of us. Joy to be starting a New Year. Regret at the things we failed to do last year. Sadness for some that all the jollity of Christmas is over. On the other hand, if you had a lonely Christmas, happiness that things are returning to normality and groups are meeting again. It is that time of year where it is customary to make resolutions: some serious, others less so.

Two of the great worries for everyone as we begin 2024 can be summed up in the following way. First why the world seems to ignore what a key feature of Christmas was about: namely peace? It baffles me how world leaders who claim to be Christian can use their power to promote so much deadly conflict. Peace still seems far away in Palestine, Sudan, and Ukraine. It is a challenge to all Christians to implement what Christ came for.

Second we still have the ever increasing problem of poverty and how we cope with it in a modern society. Our ruling party in Scotland have produced as their answer the old chestnut of taxing the rich, but history has demonstrated so many times that this is not the answer long term and especially in Scotland where there is not a huge pool of rich to tax. Even though we are supposed to be living in a post Christian world, in the view of many our society for its raison d'être still relies on strong Christian principles. As our Central and Local Government find they can no longer provide the essential services that the population have come to take for granted, there is a much greater need for the charity sector to take up the slack. The charity sector for its part depends on humanity, rich and poor, to help it achieve a more caring society. One of the goals for Annan URC in 2024 I suggest is how we can contribute not necessarily monetarily to improving the lives of the people who suffer in the area we serve. Suffering takes many forms and one of the resolutions, listening to both Elders and Church meetings last year, is to discern how with God's help we can as a small church make a difference in our small part of the Kingdom.

Our Church Lectionary in January begins on the 7th January with the Baptism of the Lord. We will be looking at the beginning of Genesis and the beginning of Mark's Gospel and thinking about how God has this wonderful habit of shaking things up. How can we, I wonder, shake things up in a way that is manageable and acceptable?

On 14th January, in looking at 1 Samuel, we think about how to recognise what God is actually calling us to do. This is followed on the 21st January by looking at Jonah chapter 3, in trying to consider how we respond to God's call. Finally on the 28th January we look at Deuteronomy chapter 18, in trying to discern what actually comes to us from God.

Janet and I both wish you a happy and prosperous New Year.


#### WELL DONE EVERYONE!

#### CHRIST IN THE RUBBLE

You may have read that most of the Christmas 2023 celebrations in Bethlehem were cancelled. This powerful photograph below shows a nativity scene in the Evangelical Lutheran Christmas Church in Bethlehem. Here a service of lamentation held on 23rd December on the theme of Christ in the Rubble included an equally powerful sermon preached by Rev Dr Munther Isaac.



The image and sermon certainly made me question what is the world doing to Christ now in the lives of those with whom He identifies. The phrase "Silence is complicity" echoes repeatedly in my brain and I echo the voices of the congregation in their response at the end of that sermon.

...... "Christmas in Bethlehem, the birthplace of Jesus, is this manger. This is our message to the world today. It is a gospel message, a true and authentic Christmas message, about the God who did not stay silent, but said his word, and His Word is Jesus. Born among the occupied and marginalised. He is in solidarity with us in our pain and brokenness. This manger is our message to the world today - and it is simply this: the genocide must stop NOW. Let us repeat to the world."

Stop this genocide NOW. This is our plea.

This is our prayer: Hear, oh God. AMEN.

Commitment for Life has opted to take action in four vulnerable areas around the world. These include Israel and the occupied Palestinian territory, Bangladesh, Zimbabwe, and Central America encompassing Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador and Guatemala. It is supporting campaigns and projects that include tax justice, climate justice, Fairtrade and women's rights.
